





We will start with a simple meal of soup, salad, and bread, along with a traditional Ugandan bean dish.

We will then use patterns provided by Sole Hope to cut out pieces from our old jeans that will be turned into shoes by Sole Hope shoemakers in Uganda.


What to bring:

One or two pairs of old jeans—adult sized, regular denim is recommended. Denim with stretch is not recommended. If children want to donate their jeans, we will find a use for them.

Fabric scissors, if you have or can borrow some.

Sole Hope asks that with each pair of shoe tops, we donate \$10, which covers the costs of completing the shoes and transporting them to the children who will wear them. BFF has paid for the first ten shoes; we will take a free will offering at the Shoe Party should we end up making more than ten shoes.

Since the scissors will be sharp, we will ask the children to help assemble Soul Hope Care Kits, similar to First Aid kits, which will also be shipped to Uganda. Further info can be found at www.solehope.org.



The Easter special collection will benefit a Connecticut shelter for migrant children; **Noank Community Support Services** located near Groton. At this time, they have unaccompanied 10-12 minor children (teens mostly) from the border in their care, and are at or near capacity all the time. They also have other shelter-homes for homeless or disadvantaged local youth. Regina Moller, director of the shelter says it provides a family-like environment for up to 12 children while it looks for sponsors, typically family members living in the U.S., who can take them - a process that typically takes four to six weeks. She says the teens in her shelter had left their home countries unaccompanied by their parents to escape severe threats and violence.





SCRIP-SURE

What is it? Scrip-sure is a fundraising program for our church,

which allows the regular shopping we do at a variety of retailers to generate income for the church. How? Participating retailers sell gift certificates or gift cards to our church at a discount. Church members buy the certificates for full face value and redeem them for full face value, and our church keeps the difference as revenue. Everybody wins! The retailers get our business, and our church gets a regular source of revenue that involves nothing other than what we would all be doing anyway — shopping/spending at grocery stores, drugstores, restaurants, gas stations, and many other businesses, including online retailers.

We have most of the usual cards in inventory for immediate purchase this morning. Here is a partial list of cards typically available:

Grocery: Big Y, Stop & Shop, Trader Joe's, WholeFoods, Westside Market

The next order for physical cards not stocked in inventory will be placed on April 28 (with delivery on May 5). E-cards may be ordered anytime. A complete listing of all retailers available through our program can be picked up at the scrip table in Chapin Hall.

Did you know that you can donate to the Rocky Hill Food Pantry and "Covenant-to-Care for Children" through our scrip program? Your cash/check donations are used to buy gift cards to local groceries (food pantry) or other retail stores (CC). For these donations, we do not retain any profit, so a \$1.00 donation effectively buys about \$1.07 in groceries or clothing. You may donate at the scrip table in Chapin Hall.
