





#### SCRIP-SURE

What is it? Scrip-sure is a fundraising program for our church, which allows the regular shopping we do at a variety of retailers to generate income for the church. How? Participating retailers sell gift certificates or gift cards to our church at a discount. Church members buy the certificates for full face value and redeem them for full face value, and our church keeps the difference as revenue. Everybody wins! The retailers get our business, and our church gets a regular source of revenue that involves nothing other than what we would all be doing anyway — shopping/spending at grocery stores, drugstores, restaurants, gas stations, and many other businesses, including online retailers.

Today is the deadline to place orders for gift cards that are not kept in inventory. Orders may be turned in at the scrip table in Chapin Hall, or emailed to treasurer@rhccucc.org by tonight. Orders placed today will be available for pickup next Sunday, Nov. 1. The next opportunities to place orders will be Nov. 15, Nov. 29, and Dec. 13.

Did you know that you can donate to the Rocky Hill Food Pantry through our scrip program? Your cash/check donations are used to buy gift cards to local groceries. These are then donated directly to the Food Pantry, or used to buy needed items. For these donations, we do not retain any profit, so a \$1.00 donation effectively buys about \$1.07 in groceries. You may donate at the scrip table in Chapin Hall.



# PROMISES KEPT

Lakota Descendant Picked As CNN Top 10 Hero Of 2015

GLASTONBURY -- When Rochelle Ripley became a grandmother in 1996, she decided it was time to honor a pledge she made to her own grandmother: to return to the South Dakota reservation of their ancestors and help their people.

Ripley, a descendant of the Lakota people, began the nonprofit, hawkwing, Inc., fulfilling the promise she made as a girl.

On Thursday, CNN announced that her efforts had landed her on its list of the "Top Ten Heroes of 2015."


"This isn't about me, but my people," Ripley said. "It always has been." For years, Ripley has been organizing drives in town to collect toys, clothing, personal-care items, beds and blankets for people living on the Cheyenne River Lakota Reservation in South Dakota.

The reservation is the poorest county in the United States, with limited health care, a life expectancy of only 48 years, 90 percent unemployment and an average annual income per person of only \$2,926, according to Ripley's website, hawkwing.org. CNN has recognized Ripley's efforts to provide books and medical supplies, bring in photography equipment for a Lakota calendar fundraiser, and gather toys and gifts for an annual holiday giveaway for the 2,600 children there. Several times a year, everything is hauled in a tractor-trailer to the reservation.

"I'm thrilled on so many levels," Ripley said.

Recently, Ripley has expanded her group's efforts, bringing doctors and den-

tists to the reservation. Later this year, former Connecticut state archaeologist Nick Bellantoni will head to the reservation for a dig so young people can learn about career opportunities.

"For me, it's about keeping a promise ...," Ripley said of the pledge she made to her Lakota grandmother. "But it's also the story of Native America and getting the message about the Lakota people out. Hollywood movies aren't who we are."

Laura Fraser, now a retired teacher, joined Ripley's effort eight years ago, and it wasn't long before she knew what she wanted to do in retirement.

She and her husband have been out to the reservation many times over the years. Hawkwing is still an all-volunteer group with no paid staff. Ripley says it is the "true essence of giving."

"She is the most giving, passionate person when it comes to the Native Americans," said Fraser, who nominated Ripley for the CNN Heroes award. "She's given so many of us a wonderful opportunity to help those in need. It took a number of years to gain their trust, but now, to see how they react when she comes or when the items are delivered, is just wonderful. "She has so much to offer," Fraser added. "Not only to her people on the reservation, but we, the volunteers, are better people because of her."

Linda Ball, another volunteer, was with Ripley when she got a call from the reservation about a blind woman needing a washer and dryer and a kitchen floor so she wouldn't trip and fall. Ripley secured the appliances from a family moving out of town, and a local company donated the flooring and tools to install it.

"She always says she'll do her best, but she always comes through for them," Ball said. "She will ask anyone for stuff for the reservation. She gets textbook companies to donate books and mattress companies to donate mattresses. We've estimated she's brought \$9 million in goods and services to the reservation. This is her job. This is her life."

Each of CNN's 10 heroes will receive \$10,000 and be part of the "CNN Heroes: An All-Star Tribute" show scheduled to be broadcast Dec. 6.

A Hero Of The Year will be selected by the end of the year and will receive \$100,000. Ripley said if she is selected, the money will go to a housing effort on the reservation.

**BOCHELLE BIPLEY** of Glastonbury, a Lakota descendant, will receive \$10,000 and national recognition as one of CNN's "Top Ten Herces of 2015." Ripley is the founder of hawkwing, Inc., a nonprofit that benefits the residents of the Cheyenne River Lakota Reservation.
