Resurrection in April

*Praise [God] for the budding green,
April's resurrection scene;
Praise [God] for the shining hours,
Starring all the land with flowers.*



Those are the second-stanza words of the hymn "Praise to God, Your Praises Bring," found in the Pilgrim Hymnal's "Changing Seasons" section. There's a stanza for each of the other seasons too. *Praise [God] for the summer rain, feeding, day and night, the grain... Praise [God] for the winter's rest, snow that falls on nature's breast...*

You may not be among those who praise God for snow. It's been a long winter around here, and mostly everybody I know has complained about it. They can't wait for "April's resurrection scene," that finally-spring that finally comes, no matter how long or intense the winter before it, when everything, seemingly overnight, buds out and turns green and starts the next round of visible growing. It's just about here (even though as I write this, the snow banks are still pretty big).

Personally, I can't imagine living someplace where there is no change of seasons. Just as I can't imagine living through a church year with no change of seasons. Imagine if it was always the Pentecost season, and it never turned to Advent. Or Christmas. Or Epiphany. Or Lent. Or Easter. Just one big long Pentecost season, all the time. What would we miss, if we didn't dip in and out of the full spectrum... of moods, of highs and lows, of colors, music, themes, wisdom for all different places in life...? What if we never went into the wilderness of Lent, or into the waiting and watching of Advent... what if we only tried to have the joys but not the laments, the easy but not the hard, of the Jesus story, the Christian story....? You only have to think about it for a minute to realize that without the "wintry" places, spiritually speaking, we wouldn't have the story at all. It would be some fantasy about a trouble-free, trial-resistant life, where it never turns to Lent and there's no wilderness. Of course, in such a fantasy there would be no Easter either, because what is rising if there has not been dying? Some people might like such a tale. But it wouldn't correspond to anybody's actual life.

What corresponds to our actual lives is the unfolding of seasons, all of them. What speaks to the realities we know is the full spectrum of harsh and gentle, up and down, peace and lament, dying and rising. It's not for nothing that we celebrate Easter only after we have kept a solemn Holy Week that takes us through a dying. Unless we let ourselves touch the depths and be touched by them, the rest of it can't speak to us either. It's all of a piece, a sacred rhythm of everything.

So, spring is on its way. Easter will be celebrated. We will be full of the language of hope and rebirth and new life, as we should be. Let's not forget, though, that all that precedes the part we like best, in earth-seasons or spiritual seasons, is helping to prepare us for it. That, we might say, is a spiritual law: a given in the way things work, often quietly and out of our direct awareness, but elementally important and needed. Even some of our hymns help us to name that. Here, by the way, is the full stanza in "Praise to God..." that celebrates winter and its function:

*Praise [God] for the winter's rest,
Snow that falls on nature's breast;
Praise for happy dreams of birth,
Brooding in the quiet earth.*

For whatever has been brooding in quiet... in us, among us, in the church, in the world... for whatever the long weeks of winter have made us ready to see...for whatever new life will now be possible only because it was laying low for a season... alleluia.



Church School

We finished our 5th faith formation unit of the year, *Meals of Blessing*. We have learned about Passover, communion, and washing feet. We have learned how communion is a meal of blessing, of love, how it is a sacrament for us, and how it calls us into prayer and into service in the world. We have baked hot cross buns and bread, made Easter cards, walked a labyrinth in prayer, and gotten a behind the scenes tour from the Deacons as they showed us how they prepare communion. And, lastly together we prepared and shared communion.

After Easter we are looking forward to a “Celebrating God’s creation” unit as we explore our call to care for God’s creation.

Youth Group

We kicked off our first youth group in March with RHCC Lenten Madness. In a bracket style, single elimination tournament, we pitted some our favorite as well as unusual bible characters against each other. Turns out (not to anyone’s surprise) we’re really competitive, stubborn, and opinionated. So after much arguing about the merits of particular bible characters, several bouts had to be decided with coin tosses. In the end though, Eve beat Micah in the final round to become the winner of RHCC Lenten Madness 2015. We also met on Palm Sunday for a time of prayer, reflection, and preparation for Holy Week.

All Youth Group events for the year will be open to 6th-12th graders, and when appropriate 6th-8th graders and 9th-12th graders will break off for separate discussion groups. We will meet several times throughout the year for Youth Group Night Out events and service projects. Noah’s Table now meets twice a month on Sunday evenings from 5 PM – 6:30 PM for dinner, fellowship, and faith formation. 



FROM THE MODERATOR



VISION

In December, nearly 50 people participated in a church-wide Visioning Dinner sponsored by a sub-committee appointed by the Council to lead our re-visiting and update of the church's vision. Attendees participated in small groups and activities to help answer the question **"Who are we, and who do we want to be?"** There was a tremendous amount of energy and Spirit shared throughout the evening. Please expect that this work is ongoing, and there will be additional opportunities to be a part of the visioning process.

For many congregations who engage in a church visioning (or some call it strategic planning), it's an opportunity to deeply discuss what we love about our church...but it's also a time to talk about the real mission of church, and specifically, our church. It's one thing to say, "no matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here," but it's another thing to name our goals and measures of faith-in-action. And, even more importantly, can we articulate a vision and goals for RHCC UCC that we can share with the world...in a 30 second elevator trip (if you attended the Visioning Dinner, you know what I'm talking about).

So what does a good vision with goals look like? Think in terms of 1, 3, and maybe (at the most) 5 years. That's right...we want our vision and goals to reflect "Who we are, and who we want to be" in the short-term. Dream, yes. But, the time to wake-up and commit to those dreams is NOW.

Here are some examples of where our journey might lead us:

We have made a bold declaration, defining ourselves as an **Open and Affirming Christian community**. This sets us apart as a uniquely inclusive church—different from other churches even in this town. Our doors: busted open; our Communion table: welcoming ALL; our organization: with opportunities for each of us to be ministers. **What expressions do we make to each other, and to those outside of RHCC UCC, to actively live into this message that welcomes ALL?**

In 2012, we received the designation of **Global Mission Church** from the United Church of Christ. With the help of our Board for Missions and many members throughout our congregation, we are invited to pray regularly for our sisters and brothers doing mission work in the world. We are invited to study and learn about God's children in God's world. And, we are challenged to think not only in terms of mission in

our backyard. No, serving only those within our arms reach is a reflection of scarcity. Rather, we think in Global terms: **here, near, and everywhere.**

But let's not be boastful. Our sisters and brothers in the progressive (yes...we CAN call ourselves progressive), wider church are calling us into even deeper relationship with one another. Can we imagine ourselves becoming **a church that advocates for justice and peace?** I am not talking about politics. Churches that advocate for justice and peace challenge each other to use the lens of our faith to inform our personal decisions. How do we manage God's worldwide household? We ask our children "What would Jesus do?" Is that a sentiment adults grow out of, or a seed that blossoms and re-blossoms again and again along our lifelong journey to be followers of Christ?

As our re-commitment to a vision begins to develop and grow the ministries and mission of RHCC UCC, **new people will come to this community**—to share our love of worship, music, faith formation among children and adults, mission & generosity, deep friendships, and our beloved Meeting House. With a vision and God's help, it's all possible.

I give thanks to God for each one of you.

Scrip-Sure: Upcoming Schedule

The next deadline for placing scrip orders is Sunday, March 29. Order forms may be turned in at the scrip table in Chain Hall on Sunday morning, or emailed to treasurer@rhccucc.org by the end of that day. These orders will be available for pickup on Easter morning, April 5.

As we head into our sixth year of the Scrip-Sure program, we've now booked more than \$70,000 in total profits, including more than \$15,000 in the current fiscal year to date. For more details on this vital program, visit the RHCC web site at rhccucc.org/scrip.

Orders are typically placed on the last Sunday of each month, but cards from more than 35 different retailers are typically kept in inventory and available for purchase almost every Sunday morning following the worship service.

Adventures in the City has been serving Hartford's most vulnerable youth for over 30 years and serves a critical need for urban youth by addressing summer learning loss.

Summer learning loss among our low income children is a primary cause of the achievement gap in the United States and certainly in Connecticut. More than half of the achievement gap between lower and higher income youth can be explained by unequal access to summer learning opportunities. As a result, low-income youth are less likely to graduated from high school and enter college.

The theme for this year's program is "Adventures in the City." We have designed a high quality, fun, engaging, and creative summer curriculum that revolves around a new *adventure in the city* each week. Whether it's a trip to a museum, a park, the Science Center...whatever the trip may be, the academic lessons for that week will revolve around the trip so that the learning is fun and feels like summer, not school. Additionally, we will have an athlete, musician, and artist in residence so our youth will benefit from five weeks of in-depth enrichment opportunities with highly trained specialists. There will also be a weekly trip to Auer Farm in Bloomfield where students will engage in science and environmental studies in a hands-on environment.

The five week, full day program will serve 75 youth in grades K-3. It will take place at Milner School on Vine Street in Hartford and is open to any low-income child in Hartford. The program costs \$60 per student for the full five weeks, but no student will be turned away for financial reasons.


