You'll probably be reading this newsletter during Holy Week. Easter, as you know, is on April 1. An odd day for Easter. I think it's happened one other time in my career.

April 1, of course, is known as April Fools Day. The origin of April Fools Day is obscure, and it probably goes back into the Middle Ages. So much for that. This is a day that many observe by playing practical jokes on people. It's a time-honored tradition. In the 1850's in Great Britain, the public was invited to attend the annual "Washing the Lions" day at the Tower of London Zoo. Of course, it didn't actually happen.

There's no theological content in April Fools Day, and its coincidence with Easter is a curious one. However, there are connections. If we consider the events of Holy Week and Easter there are a lot of surprises, the most significant one being the Resurrection itself.

We wonder about how the Resurrection happened. There is a lot of debate over whether Jesus' physical body came back to life after enduring a gruesome and excruciatingly painful death. Other theories include the thought that Jesus didn't actually die on the cross, and he recovered enough in the cool air of the tomb to emerge on the first Easter. Some have come up with the theory that Jesus' spirit was raised but his body wasn't.

A lot of speculation swirls around the Shroud of Turin, believed by many to be the burial cloth of Jesus. An exhaustive study of the cloth in the 70's and 80's concluded that the image was not painted, but that it dated from the Middle Ages. Around 2005 a discovery was made that cast the Carbon 14 test in doubt. The areas from which the samples were taken were shown to be partly the original linen and partly a cotton patch woven in to repair a corner of the cloth, and this skewed the results. This is a very complicated issue and we don't have time for it now, but the Shroud clearly shows the body of a man who was crucified. Was it Jesus? We'll never know for sure. Possibly. Those who believe that the shroud is genuine also see it as proof of the resurrection of Christ.

For many Christians the bodily resurrection of Jesus is essential to the Christian faith. I feel that the boldness of the disciples in proclaiming their new faith had to be founded in a substantive experience of the resurrected Christ somehow. It had to be more than just a vision. What happened, exactly? Something otherworldly, apparently. What we do know is that the disciples were given the strength to proclaim a new faith that spread like wildfire across the Mediterranean basin and beyond. We're the beneficiaries of that determination.

RHCC Missions Update

FOODSHARE WALK
Against Hunger

In March, the following contributions were made on behalf of our congregation. Through your generosity, we're changing lives...here, near, and far.

\$3,500 – Adventures in the City Freedom School (same as last year). Last year, this program provided six weeks of full-day summer enrichment free of charge to 100 of Hartford's most vulnerable children in grades k-3. Bob Inderbitzen attended the student-graduation/celebration last summer. It's an impressive program, and our donation fulfills our ongoing support for the good work of the Christian Activities Council in Hartford.

\$600 – Center Church Community Meal. This money was used to purchase \$10 gift cards for 60 people served by this community meal on Sunday, March 11. Center Church in Harford (a short 7-minute ride from our church!) regularly hosts these meals which serve our poor neighbors and people experiencing homelessness. Minister for Children and Youth Georgette Huie organized youth and adult volunteers from our church to help prepare and serve the meal. Georgette shared "I could see that the gift cards lifted their spirits in that moment, and am confident that when they go to spend the card, they will experience a moment of dignity, being able to rightfully pay for a treat or a necessity of their choosing."

\$360 – Global Ministries Child and Elder Sponsorship (same as last year). This is our second year supporting a sponsored-elder, Mrs. Yangkey. She lives in Zongri, Tibet, and receives all of her help through the Tibetan Refugee Self Help Centre. Please keep Mrs. Yangkey in your prayers.

\$1,000 – Back Bay Mission. This continues our annual commitment to this important ministry in Biloxi, Mississippi. Members of our congregation have traveled to Bay Back Mission for multiple mission trips. Please learn more about Back Bay Mission, and their simple mission on the Gulf Coast: to strengthen neighborhoods, seek justice, and transform lives: thebackbaymission.org

S.P.I.R.I.T. Church School News

On March 11, four of our middle school youth and five adults spent three hours at Center Church in Hartford cooking and serving the Sunday Community Meal. In just those three hours, we made a nutritious complete meal for 60 homeless and poor folks, including two families with young children. We were helped earlier by 4th grader Mollie Engel and her family, who baked delicious chocolate chocolate chip cookies for the dessert. Mollie had been asking her mom if she could serve in some way, and this was a perfect fit. Mollie's a great baker!

The youth came away from this experience wanting to do it again, soon. They saw and heard how the meal we made was so badly needed by the guests. They also saw how grateful people were, and how supportive and encouraging they were of the youth. Our group worked together in a truly intergenerational way, with adults and youth sharing all aspects of the tasks at hand: prepping, mixing, serving, washing. There was also opportunity for interacting with the guests, and our youth did not hesitate to do just that.

The Board for Missions, represented by Wendy Ware and Bob Inderbitzen, brought 60 gift cards (\$10 each) which were given to each guest. I saw the looks of surprise, delight, and gratitude on the recipients' faces as they received their cards, and imagined the moments of dignity they would feel when paying for a treat or a necessity of their choosing.

Formerly homeless people talk of how such care and effort by volunteers gave them hope. In turn, our team, adults and youth alike, came away with a sense of purpose fulfilled and a sense that somehow, this was a really cool way to spend three hours.

Perhaps, because of our youth, participating in this meal will become a regular habit for RHCC.





Frank Roswell Fuller Scholarship

This scholarship requires that you be a member of the UCC/Congregational Church. Applications are available in the church office. Frank Roswell Fuller was born in Hartford in 1873 and attended local public schools. He later formed his own company at 40 Wall Street known as Fuller & Company, which operated from 1904 to 1920. When he retired he came to live in West Hartford. He died in 1957. His will established a substantial scholarship fund. Mr. Fuller was always interested in helping "needy, deserving" students obtain the education that he had not been able to enjoy himself. The deadline for submitting your application and other documents is **May 15**th.




