Talking, Listening, Praying

On the whole, we are a pretty talkative society. Besides any inperson words we might speak to other people, face-to-face or over a telephone, we also "talk" by texting, tweeting, e-mailing, blogging, facebooking. There are more forms than ever before



for us to get our own words out there, to make ourselves heard. Not that this is bad (unless it degenerates into a *me-me-me* mindset). It's just that speaking is only half of communication.

The other half is listening. This we are not as good at. Even when we are in conversation with other people and we appear to be listening to them, often all we're really doing is waiting until it's our turn to talk again. Listening holds the potential for changing us by what we hear, so it's more risky: at least when we're the ones speaking, we can feel as though we've got some control.

This is one more way, among so many others, that Christian spirituality asks of us something counter-cultural – that we learn to see and do things differently from the way the world generally sees and does them. It aims to make us listeners first: to God, to God's creation, to the Holy Spirit deep within us, to each other. But mostly to God. Or for God. Prayer is, in fact, that: listening for God. So many times we back away from even the thought of prayer, because we don't know it's listening, we think it's speaking. So, we think it needs to be covered in words, beautiful words, the exactly right words, at exactly the right time, words we think other people would admire. And mostly we just don't have it in us to produce such words that, in our own minds, would qualify on all those counts.

There is a story told about an exchange Mother Teresa once had with a reporter, who had asked her about praying: "What do you say to God?" "I don't say anything," she replied. "I listen." "Then what does God say to you?" "God doesn't say anything," she replied. "God listens." Confused, the reporter then asked, "How can you pray, when both you and God do nothing but listen?" Mother Teresa responded, "Explaining that would take far longer than you have time for."

It is easy to confuse the saying of words with praying. *There, I've said my prayer*. But just because we're doing one doesn't mean we're necessarily doing the other, yet. There is in each of us a contemplative heart and mind that do not need to produce words, especially not on cue, because they're wired for a kind of deep and wordless listening for the Sacred Other, that can awaken any time, anywhere. Even – especially -- in the midst of as chronically talkative a world as ours.

Try it.

Church School

On January 5th, the children and youth of the S.P.I.R.I.T. Church School beautifully lead worship, as they shared the birth story of our faith in word and song, with our annual Epiphany Pageant. (See pictures below).

We have started our 3rd faith formation unit of the year, *Praying With Jesus*. We are studying the Lord's prayer. Jesus' words recorded in both Matthew and Luke, were a response to a request from his disciples: "Lord, teach us to pray." Jesus' reply has become a central, virtually unchanged piece of our Christian worship. The prayer is spoken on behalf of others, and echoes with voices from the past, present, and future. The emphasis is on community, rather than self. Through this concern for others, expressed in prayer, we can feel connected with God.

COME JOIN THE CIRCLE: Unit 3 – Praying With Jesus

Exploring Prayer

This unit explores how to pray. Explore prayer. You may use the following devotionals to restart or add to your regular prayer practices and share with others what you learn along the way.

ASK!

In Luke11:5-8, Jesus further teaches his disciples about prayer using a parable to talk about how prayer involves the actions of asking, searching, and knocking. Think about how it feels to go to ask someone for help. First you must get over your own fear, then find someone to ask, then actually do the asking. You need to ask, search, and knock.

When Jesus taught the disciples to pray, it helped them to see the character and nature of the one to whom we pray. God is like a neighbor who answers a friend who is not ashamed to ask. God is also like a perfect parent who seeks to give only good things to their child. In your prayer time, think about the nature of the God to whom you are praying.

Trace your hand on a piece of paper. Make a list of spiritual needs that you are seeking in your life and write them on the hand. Include the spiritual needs of those close to you and concentrate on how those needs might be fulfilled. Each day pray the Lord's Prayer, adding the items on your handprint. Be sure that you do not think of this as a grocery list of wants but rather spiritual needs that will help you to be closer to God. As you pray the Lord's Prayer, visualize all Christians – past, present, and future – praying with you.

A Prayer For The Unit. Eternal Spirit, Life-giver, Pain-bearer, Love-maker, Source of all that is and that shall be, Father and Mother of us all, loving God, in whom is heaven; The hallowing of your name echoes through the universe! The way of your justice be followed by the peoples of the world! Your heavenly will be done by all created beings! Your commonwealth of peace and freedom sustain our hope and come on earth. With the bread we need for today, feed us. In the hurts we absorb from one another, forgive us. In times of temptation and test, strengthen us. From trials too great to endure, spare us. From the grip of all that is evil, free us. For you reign in the glory of the power that is love, now and forever. Amen.


Volunteer Opportunity



February 2014: **Presence in Troubled Times** Written by Matthew Fehse February 1, 2014

God will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail. Isaiah 58:11

In December I travelled to work with partners who suffered damages from Typhoon Haiyan (known as Typhoon Yolanda in the Philippines). Bethany Hospital, founded by The United Church of Christ Philippines (UCCP), a Global Ministries partner, suffered significant damages. Flooding surges reached the top of the second floor destroying most of the equipment and toppling the emergency generator - rendering the hospital ineffective. In spite of this, Bethany continues to serve, offering free medicine and consultations for walk-in patients.

Bethany opened its doors to Doctors Without Borders and a French medical team from Medecins San Frontieres. A water filtration system was installed and free water given to all the people who came from all corners to get barrels filled. It was really great. Bethany is also a site for field coordination and a gathering point for pastors from congregations around the area.

Bethany frequently sends out teams to surrounding communities for trauma healing and stress debriefing. For children, there are games, one in particular called "Balay (Home), Baguio (Storm), Bata (Children)." It is similar to musical chairs and children run around screaming and giggling, but when someone calls out "Baguio!" they have to change homes made up of two other children facing one another holding hands for a roof. This is followed by children sharing how they feel about changing homes because of the storm. Adults find singing and small group discussion places to process feelings and hopes while talking about what to do with the immediate future.

There is a tremendous amount of work ahead, but God's love is present in the laughter, in the distribution of food, in the community of people who offer support, like you. Please continue to pray and support Global Ministries and the UCCP efforts here. This road we walk with our partner will be a very long one.


