

A BOOK FOR LENT:

Learning to Walk in the Dark, by Barbara Brown Taylor

New York Times bestselling author, teacher and former pastor Barbara Brown Taylor writes about having grown increasingly uncomfortable and impatient with Christian teachings that celebrate "the light" while denying the existence of darkness and its wisdom. Doesn't God work in the nighttime too? "Darkness," she writes, "is shorthand for anything that scares me." That could include the fear of dementia, the loss of somebody we love, the challenges of aging, the fear of being alone, or anything at all that feels like a place of "darkness" to us. What do we learn when we are afraid? Taylor argues that it is precisely in such times that we learn courage, and learn to understand the world and trust the presence of God in new ways: "So, I can only conclude one thing: I need the darkness as much as I need the light, because there are things there I will learn in no other way."

(The preaching text for any given Sunday may or may not be taken from these.) Reading them and looking for thematic connections is one way to do some Biblical exploration.

Jesus, the Storyteller

Jesus was a wonderful storyteller – a teller of theological stories. Jesus crafted word pictures about familiar objects and situations to tell the good news of God's love for all people. This unit we will hear, dramatize, investigate, and live into several of Jesus' stories called parables. We will explore Jesus' parable of the sower, the parable of the yeast, the parable of the bridesmaids, and the parable of the talents.

Stories all Around. Everyone has a story. Some share them with ease while others need an invitation to voice their stories. Look and listen around your neighborhood. Who knows the local anecdotes and is familiar with the local characters? Take time to ask and listen. Encourage your children's friends to share tales of family trips and other adventures. Plan a casual block party event for storytelling that will create a web of friendships. Serve root beer floats on a hot evening or hot cocoa on a chilly winter night. Make Sunday night "story night" in your family and let everyone have a turn spinning a tale. However you choose to make stories a part of your life, regularly include favorites from the Bible. Learn from and enjoy the master storyteller, Jesus.

A Prayer For The Unit. God of stories, open us to yours. Amen.





UPCOMING SECOND HOURS

Feb. 1 A Civil Right for Adoptees – An important issue and a chance for our church to advocate within CT. Our guest will be Karen Caffrey, an attorney and psychotherapist, and President of Access CT._Church member Brian Donohue, adoptive parent and part of a grassroots organization called "Access CT," that works on issues of legal rights for adoptees, is hoping that RHCC will want to learn about and then advocate for the expansion of a current state law. An expanded law would allow persons adopted before 1983 to access their original birth certificates and thus information about their biological parentage and history – important for health care and other reasons. This access is not possible under current law. Brian hopes that RHCC will sponsor a resolution to come before the Annual Meeting of the CT Conference of the UCC, in October, 2015, so that the Conference might then become an advocating organization with the CT State Legislature for a revision of the law. The first step to our possibly becoming a sponsoring church is to become informed about the issue.

Sun., Feb. 8, 11:30 – 12:30 Literalism and the Bible

How do we read Scripture, so as to hear its true meanings? Reading it literally, taking everything at face value, generally creates more questions than answers (e.g, if Adam and Eve were the first two people on earth, and had sons, where did the sons find women to marry, as the Bible says they did? What about all the other things in the Bible that we would find it hard to believe, given what science teaches us about the way things work?). How do we understand these texts other than at a literal level?

SCRIP-SURE Update

During calendar year 2014, RHCC earned \$17,500 from the sale of \$247,000 of scrip. 86 individuals or families bought scrip one or more times during the year. Counting each family unit as two buyers, this represented 122 individual scrip buyers, an increase of 15% over 2013.

The face amount sold and profits for 2014 were essentially the same as in 2013. Grocery cards continued to be the dominant cards sold, producing almost 50% of all profits. Over the year, cards for 114 different retailers were sold.

The next ordering deadline will be on February 22. Orders placed by that date will be available for pickup on Sunday, March 1. As usual, a limited supply of the most popular cards will also be kept in inventory and available for sale each Sunday morning in Chapin Hall.



On Consecration Sunday Barry Wilcock announced that 68 pledging units completed "Estimate of Giving cards". In the weeks following, those who were unable to be with us that day have sent in cards for a total of 103 pledging units. Of those 103 cards received 71 are either an increase over last year or new pledges. Thank you all!

By now everyone who completed an "Estimate of Giving card" should have received a letter from the Stewardship committee confirming their financial commitment to the mission and ministry of Rocky Hill Congregational Church.
