OLD & NEW

New and old, old and new. Practically everything in life lives in this polarity... what we already have and what we don't have yet...what we've already seen and what we haven't seen yet...what we already know and what we've yet to discover...tradition and innovation...familiar and unfamiliar...ancient and modern...heritage and future....that which is preserved and that which is yet to be formed. We can find ourselves, our lives, our faith and our church in there somewhere. To be human is to live with both what is old and what is new.

And so we are always building upon what is, what has been and what used to be, and striving from there to live toward what might be, what longs to be, and what summons us -- or, to put it another way, where God is leading us. The gospel is nothing if not movement. It calls us not to find some comfortable place or state and then just stay put forever. It calls us to a dynamic living within which we will sharpen our sense of when we need "old" and when we need "new," and how to move with grace with them both. It calls us to value past and tradition not for their own sake, but for the sake of how they can help anchor and equip us for a newly imagined future. Sometimes we need more of one, sometimes more of the other; always we need open and trusting discernment of what faithfulness would call for right now.

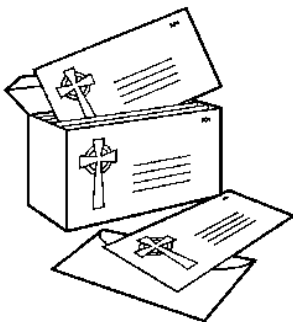
Sometime within the new year now dawning, RHCC will call a new pastor and begin a new relationship and partnership with that person. It will be a new time in the life of a centuries-old church. It will manifest "what is old and what is new" -- a continuing history and a new chapter of it. The new ministry will build upon much that is in place, even as it will bring something new to this church. It's always both. And along with the excitement about what (and who) is coming next, there is also, of course, a bit of natural apprehension about the not knowing. It's always both. When your new minister arrives, you can expect some continuity and you can expect some change. It's always both.

Let the beginning of a new year stand as a good symbol of where you are as a church, for it holds both what is new and what is old, just as has been true of this interim period, and true of the whole journey of any community of faith over time. As Jesus says to his disciples, recognizing the kingdom of God – "being well-trained for it" – has something to do with navigating old and new, all the time. And so it is with us.

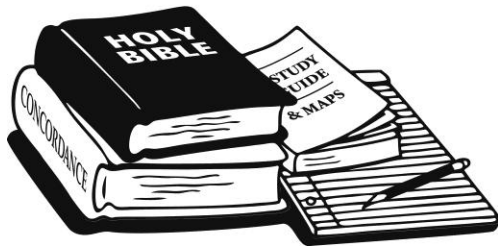

"Things I've Wondered about Christianity" Discussion Series

Based on topics and questions submitted by members of the congregation, several small-group discussion opportunities are being planned (Pastor Brenda will facilitate):

Sun. , Jan. 25, 11:30 – 12:30 Images of God

What do we mean when we say the word "God" ?? What content do we have in mind? Do we mean a being? A spirit? A force? As our scientific and historical understandings of the universe have evolved, has this meant an evolution also in our image and understanding of God? In our conversation, we'll be seeking not the "right" answer, but a way of talking with each other about our (probably different) perspectives on what we mean when we say "God" – and how our understanding may have shifted, or be shifting, over time.

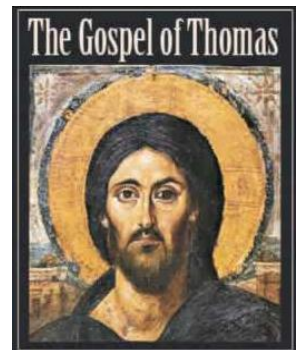
Sun., Feb. 8, 11:30 – 12:30 Literalism and the Bible

How do we read Scripture, so as to hear its true meanings? Reading it literally, taking everything at face value, generally creates more questions than answers (e.g, if Adam and Eve were the first two people on earth, and had sons, where did the sons find women to marry, as the Bible says they did? What about all the other things in the Bible that we would find it hard to believe, given what science teaches us about the way things work?). How do we understand these texts other than at a literal level?

Future conversations will also be scheduled... topics will include prayer, atonement, and others.

Wednesday Scripture study will resume with the Gospel of Thomas

Weekly Scripture study will resume on **Wednesdays, 12:00 – 1:00**, beginning on **January 14**. The first text we will look at will be **The Gospel of Thomas**. Discovered in 1945, it is one of the several gospels we now know existed in early Christian times but was not included in the canon of the New Testament. Copies of the text will be made available at the first session. No need for any particular background, come and explore what the Gospel of Thomas says that Jesus taught... and see how it compares with what we are familiar with from the gospels we know.

Jesus, the Storyteller

Jesus was a wonderful storyteller – a teller of theological stories. Jesus crafted word pictures about familiar objects and situations to tell the good news of God's love for all people. This unit we will hear, dramatize, investigate, and live into several of Jesus' stories called parables. SCRIP-SURE

A Million Reasons to Support Scrip-Sure

We began our Scrip-Sure fundraising program five years ago. In that first month (November, 2009), 28 members and friend bought \$6510 face value of scrip, earning \$972 for RHCC. The results were encouraging enough that we decided to pursue this as an ongoing fundraiser beginning in January of 2010.

In December, 2014, we passed the five-year anniversary with a rather remarkable milestone. Since inception, 100 members and friends have now bought scrip, and our **cumulative sales of scrip have just passed the \$1 million mark!** More importantly, over the five years, RHCC has realized over \$67,000 in earnings.

At our current pace, it won't take another five years to reach the second million, as we've sold over \$250,000 in just the past 12 months, earning almost \$18,000 in that span to help "fund our faith."

It takes diligence and perseverance from a lot of people to achieve these results. Gail and I do a lot of the groundwork and administration, but without widespread support from all of you, we wouldn't have the success that we've had. We push, but you pull! And you've all developed quite a pull!

Our end-of-December order deadline will be pushed ahead to January 6th, so we'll have the opportunity to start out 2015 on a strong note. And just because your Christmas shopping is over, remember that more than half of our earnings come from the sale of grocery cards. I'm quite sure that most of you plan to continue to eat in January. If you shop for groceries at Big Y, Stop & Shop, Shop Rite, Trader Joe's, Westside Market, or Whole Foods, then you can use scrip to support your eating *and* your church. If you get prescriptions filled at CVS or Walgreens, then you can use scrip to support your health *and* your church. If you dine out at restaurants like Bonefish Grill, On the Border, TGI Fridays, Bertucci's, or many others in the area, then you can use scrip to support your dining *and* your church. If you buy household items at Target, or Walmart, or HomeGoods, or Home Depot, or Lowes, then you can support your home *and* your church. If you buy clothes at Kohls, or Marshalls, or TJ Maxx, or L.L. Bean, or Dressbarn, or Macy's, or Sears, or Penneys, then you can support your wardrobe *and* your church.
