Our plan is to maximize the use of the renovated Chapin Hall to make the Country Fair an exciting and fun event for all members of the Church family.

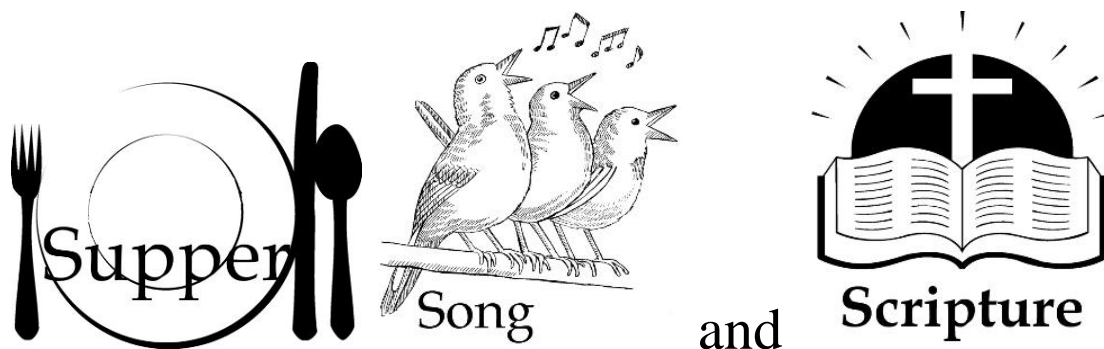
A Fair Flyer outlining all booths and their needs will be in the July-August Church Mouse. We will also be making announcement at Sunday services until Fair date October 18th.

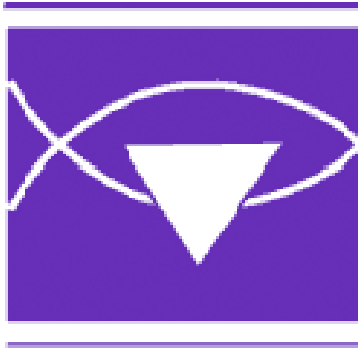

The lending library has become a major resource for all of our members. We particularly encourage those who have missed any of our formal programs to check it out. It is located in the bookcase outside the church office. Recently added are DVDs of the April 6 "What is ONA?" program. The April 27 program DVD was under development at press time, and it will also be available in the library.

To date, we have begun to address two of the four Open and Affirming themes:

- 1) ONA: a definition of the issue
- 2) What does the Bible have to say about this issue?

Over the next two months, we will begin to introduce the third theme: **What is it like to be gay? How does it feel to be the object of discrimination? Personal stories from O and A churches and people we love.** We will do so in June and July via small group discussions of video presentations. Our schedule is as follows:

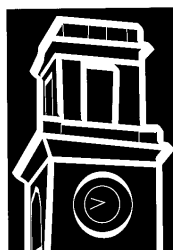

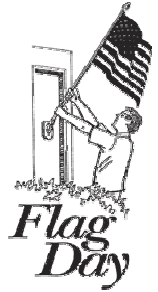

Chapin Hall renovation update – May 20, 2008

Dear Friends,

The massive new steel columns and beams were installed on April 25, completing the structural renovations. During the most critical portion of this work, it was necessary to relocate one Sunday morning church service and the concert held on April 20. With the complicated structural renovation and repairs behind us, the contractor expects to meet or exceed scheduling for the rest of the project. Progress is being made each day. The new sprinkler pipes and air conditioning ducts are installed, and framing is underway. The engineering for all of the kitchen plumbing is complete. There will be a small amount of excavation outside the church to replace and reconfigure the kitchen drain. And, the committee has reviewed the first draft of the new kitchen equipment.

Why is the project taking so much longer? The much-needed structural renovations were more complicated than anticipated. Renovating the underpinnings of our 200-year-old meeting house required careful planning. Most of the delays were associated with permitting and lengthy engineering (and re-engineering).

While we would all like the project to wrap-up faster (me especially!), the committee is satisfied that the work being completed is earnest and moving toward completion. We have an updated schedule, **estimating the project's completion by late August.**

Thank you all for your patience and support as we set our sights on completing the renovation over the summer. Please contact me with any questions.

The Inner World

One emotion often ignored in psychological studies is boredom. Someone once said that it is when we are bored that we stop reacting to the outer world and begin to be consciously touched by the inner world. Living in our extraverted culture many are not aware they have an inner world.

Those who are sometimes find that what happens in the outer world begins in the inner world. Jesus knew his inner world when he said: *“If you bring forth what is inside you, what you bring forth will save you. If you don’t bring forth what is inside you, what you don’t bring forth will destroy you”* (Gospel of Thomas).

Some find that insight useful in understanding cancer, heart problems, high blood pressure, Alzheimer’s, asthma, strokes, kidney and liver disease, diabetes, bronchitis, alcohol and drug addiction, suicide, war, violence, loneliness, anxiety, fear, depression, and spiritual hunger.

Jung advocated for a process of dialogue with the inner world he called active imagination. Over the years it has become my most reliable source of support and guidance. I have found helpmates in my inner world who know more than I do of what is going on in my life and what I need.

These inner eyes and hearts watch and listen as I walk around and when I dialogue with them I often discover things I have ignored, denied, and never considered. They often have wonderful suggestions for me when I do not know what to do.

Dialoguing with them is part of my prayer life as I have found they have a connection to God. This has helped me appreciate that Jesus and God live within us.

Sometimes when I am playing tennis or golf or doing therapy, I assume the backseat and let my inner world friends have outer world voice and action, and they astound me. Hidden instincts surface, insights are spoken that touch deeply, deep laughter comes that heals, and memories are triggered that provide important connection.

What goes on in your inner world? The inner world contains our mystical side, that timeless aspect of our lives that connects us to all that has ever lived and feels deeply. How deep do you go with yourself?

Journals often contain secret inner world musings. The world was surprised to find the moving journal writings (which became the book, *Markings*) of Dag Hammarskjöld after he died. Who do you share your inner world with? Where do you find support for what goes on inside?

Possibly boredom is an invitation to a fresh experience of the ancient and modern mysteries of the God.
