INTERIM PASTOR'S MESSAGE

On Singing Hymns



"We remember what we sing," I heard a church musician say once – meaning, we remember what we repeat singing. Yes. This was true when we were children, and it's true for us as adults. To sing something, and then to sing it again at another time, and then again, becomes a way that we carry it, a way that it remains available to us, a way that it can continue to make meaning in us and for us. People remember hymns from church long after they've forgotten what any sermons were about.

For most adults, a worship service is probably the only place we *do* sing – with others, anyway (apart from an occasional joining in on the national anthem at a ball game). In our Sunday services at RHCC, we typically have six or seven places where the whole congregation sings together: three hymns, two sung responses, a doxology, and, most Sundays, singing our children out to church school or chapel. And while we generally use sung responses from a small but growing repertoire (we've added to it this past year), when it comes to hymns, we have available to us a much larger repertoire of the music of our faith, because we have two whole hymnals (with several hundred hymns in each), plus other hymns we sometimes use that aren't in our hymnals. So we have probably sung many times before and others that we may have sung less often, or not yet -- which simply means we haven't yet had the chance to internalize them, to "remember" them and what they offer us, but which are no less solid or meaningful as expressions of our faith than the ones we may happen to have already sung more often.

Hymns function in our liturgies the same way other elements of our services do: they are chosen for their meaning, their appropriateness, and their capacity to deepen in us the resonances of the theme of a given service. Just as we thoughtfully prepare the words of a liturgy (calls to worship, prayers, etc.), we just as thoughtfully select the hymns that will work cohesively within the service as a whole. Just as those verbal elements are not interchangeable from one worship occasion to another (we wouldn't use an Advent call to worship in a Good Friday service, or funeral prayers at a baptism), hymns are not randomly interchangeable either, if we want coherence. In other words, we don't just sing anything anywhere, it matters what we sing and where we sing it, because our singing is part of our creating a total, cohesive act of worship. That's why the Sunday hymns are almost always chosen by the preaching pastor, conferring with the Minister of Music, with the aim of putting together a service where all the parts will mutually reinforce each other and resonantly unfold a theme that is appropriate to where we are in the church year. We choose each hymn with great care for its particular place on that particular day ... its words, its meaning, and the feel of its tune. Whether or not

it happens to be an often-used hymn is less important than whether it does what it needs to do in its liturgical setting.

And that's why it's wonderful that we have available to us two whole hymnals, plus other hymns as well. It means that there are many beautiful, meaningful hymn texts and tunes to draw upon in our worship...words and tunes for every theme, every mood, every occasion. Sometimes, the worship planner feels there's a hymn that would be just the perfect one to sing right after the sermon, or at the end of the service.... pieces of sung poetry that say something important exquisitely well, enabling us to express and to feel something significant for that day. The hymns, in other words, help us pray. We might even say they *are* prayer. They help us preach. They help us hear. They help us remember. They help us carry our faith.

I know that sometimes members of congregations can feel resistant to singing hymns they happen not to have already sung a lot in their particular experience. "We don't know that one," they tell their pastors. In response to that, what I think is "That just means we don't know it well *yet."* But of course, if we sing it, then it becomes more familiar. And then if we sing it again some time – even more familiar! *We remember what we sing.* Why would we want to learn and remember only a small portion of our vast hymnody and its beauty, when we could be touched by more of its range?

And how would we know what treasures we were missing, unless we were willing to sing hymns we hadn't sung yet? Every hymn we would now consider a familiar "favorite" was once new and unknown. They all got rolled out for the first time, at some point – Christmas carols, Easter hymns, "Jesus Loves Me," all of them. I have sometimes imagined the esteemed Martin Luther, first offering up his (we would now deem) majestic hymn "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God," and the people murmuring that Sunday about how they couldn't sing that, they didn't know it. Some of them may even have said that the tune was "un-sing-able." Good thing that didn't stop him, or any other composer of hymns, from writing that music which has – once we've been willing to sing it – helped our spirits feel the presence and reality of our God, in so many meaningful, beautiful and soulful ways.

Church School

May marked the end of our final curriculum unit of the year, Following Jesus' Way. During this unit we learned about Paul's travels as he went from place to place, sharing the life-changing story of Jesus' resurrection and instructing others how to live in Jesus' way. We focused on the events of Acts 16 where Paul meets Lydia and survives imprisonment for the sake of the gospel. We took to heart the themes of forgiving, healing, welcoming, and loving – words that summarize the heart of Jesus' life and ministry, and invite us to live in his way.

The children and youth of RHCC have also begun planning and writing worship for Children's Sunday, reflecting on the ways we have formed in our faith over the last year. Why it Matters.

If faith formation doesn't matter to you – it should. If the vitality and longevity of Rocky Hill Congregational Church, UCC, matters to you, than so should your faith formation and that of entire congregation. Faith Formation matters because it is the *life-long* work of the *entire* community. Faith formation matters, because without it our faith stagnates and our churches lose their relevance.

The biblical concept of home and household, of family, is inclusive, cross generational, and includes more people who are not simply connected by birth, marriage, or adoption. It is the community where we enact the love of Jesus, extending that welcome in love, service, peace, justice, action, and solidarity. This is where faith formation happens. Faith grows and thrives when the diverse, cross-generational community of the church forms together as an inclusive household, where all members learn from each other.

Each week, each month, each year at RHCC, we ask for volunteers to teach in the church school and help faith come alive and grow for our young people. Each week, each month, each year at RHCC, we ask for volunteers to offer the gift of hospitality to our young families, by staffing the We ask for volunteers so youth group can go on service trips or to child care room. denominational revivals. We offer opportunities for Bible Study to deepen our understanding of scripture, shared devotionals to offer our faith journeys before one another, and small group ministries to ask questions and learn how to testify in our faith. Here's the thing, at RHCC, we routinely are short teachers for the church school (and what teachers we do have are almost always women and parents of children in the church school, youth group, or nursery), the nursery is rarely staffed with a volunteer forcing young parents who came for worship to listen from the child care room, youth group often gets canceled for lack of chaperones, and small group ministries are canceled due to lack of interest. What kind of message does that send to our families, to our young people, to each other, when we don't offer the gift of our time and talents? What kind of message does it send when hospitality is not our priority? What kind of message does it send to each other when we aren't willing to be vulnerable enough to share our faith?

If faith formation doesn't matter to you – it should. Rocky Hill Congregation Church, UCC, is full of people with vibrant stories of faith, with talents and gifts to share and be realized, with hearts and minds that are searching and thirsting for the space and grace for their faith to grow, make meaning, and come alive. Awaken to that. Be part of making that community alive. Because when you risk your faith by joining a small group and sharing testimony, when you risk your faith by offering hospitality to one of our young families by getting to know their child in the nursery, when you risk your faith by teaching in the church school or chaperoning a youth group event and honor the covenant you made with each child at RHCC on the day of their baptism to help them grow in faith...your faith grows in ways you couldn't imagine, and as a church we become relevant and revitalized.

So the next time you see an opportunity to grow in your faith by teaching, volunteering, or joining a small group, risk your faith, be part of the community that is working to renew and revitalize RHCC, and see where God could lead you and this community of faith. It matters.

Treasurer's Report without Numbers (almost)

A lot has changed over the past 15 months from a financial perspective. When the budget for the just-completed 2013-14 fiscal year was prepared and adopted, we knew that Rev. Donna Manocchio would be leaving. But we didn't know that we'd also be replacing our office secretary and head custodian. From a staffing perspective, it's certainly been a year of significant transition.

Last year's pledge campaign started out with a goal that was equal to the actual pledges from the prior year. But we ended up falling considerably short (15%) of that target. I was recently asked why that happened, and the answer is that there were a number of contributing factors. Several large pledgers left the church, and pledges from some continuing members were reduced. We did receive some new pledges and some increases, but the net decline was pretty significant. Those decreases were proportionately greater for Benevolence pledging, which in part prompted the recent change in the way we will now allocate our aggregate giving to Missions.

In response to the lower expected revenues, we restructured the Office Manager and Custodian positions. We postponed our plans to hire a communications manager. Those staffing adjustments went a long way toward closing our budget gap. With additional savings in areas such as office supplies, kitchen supplies, postage, and computer maintenance, we managed to close the year with a balanced budget. On the Missions side, we significantly reduced our allocation to OCWM, and made minor reductions in donations to several other concerns. If you want more details, the usual Treasurer's reports (with numbers) appear as part of the RHCC Annual Reports.

As you have heard, the next pledge campaign is being deferred until the fall. We've all been asked to continue our recent pattern of giving as we transition to a new pledging approach. Instead of setting a budget and then doing our best to fund it, we'll now be determining our resources first and then setting a budget that fits those expected revenues. The current fiscal year provides the transition period from the prior model to the new one.

It's premature to know if and at what level our revenue resources will stabilize. But since staffing costs comprise two-thirds of our consolidated budget (and more than threequarters of our local operating costs), staffing will be one of the dominant considerations in making our financial ends meet. This will be one of the challenges for the Council to grapple with over the coming year. Please pray for us!

"STRENGTHEN THE CHURCH"

The "Strengthen the Church" offering is on Pentecost Sunday June 8, 2014. As God calls our congregations to be "church" in new ways, your generous gifts will plant new churches, awaken new ideas in existing churches, and develop spiritual life in our youth and young adults. Because of this offering, many more will hear the good news that "God is still speaking." All gifts are directed to activities within your local conference, as well as to UCC national ministries. An envelope is enclosed for your convenience to bring on the 8th or to mail to the church office (805 Old Main Street, Rocky Hill, CT 06067).

Recap of Scrip-Sure Fundraising Program

If you review the details of the year-end Treasurer's report in the Annual Reports, you'll see that we booked about \$17,500 of income from the Scrip-Sure program this year. That compares to \$14,000 in the previous year, up about 25%. Since the program's inception in November, 2009, we've earned more than \$55,000. (If you are unfamiliar with our Scrip-Sure program, please visit the church website and click on the "Scrip-Sure" button.)

What explains the growth over the past year?

- 1. We've been carrying a wider variety of card in inventory, which means that buyers usually don't have to wait to get the cards they want. Having all of those cards available each Sunday at the scrip table in Chapin Hall also facilitates a lot of "impulse buys." Scrip is now sold almost every Sunday, and the program has good visibility during the fellowship hour.
- 2. More than 75 member and friends bought scrip during the year. For a church of our size, that's pretty good penetration. And we've noticed that after people make their first scrip purchase, most come back for more as they realize how easy it is to use scrip for so much of their everyday shopping.
- 3. Grocery cards still account for just over 50% of all profits, dominated by Stop & Shop, Big Y, and Westside Marketplace. Even though we have been carrying a wider variety of cards in inventory, that 50% grocery share has remained very consistent. So the growth isn't just coming from the wider inventory.
- 4. We've increased publicity over the past year, with weekly emails for scrip customers, weekly specials, and a constant presence in the bulletins.
- 5. Word of mouth our best advertising is when scrip buyers spread the word, especially during fellowship hour when the scrip table is visible, accessible, and often busy.

We now sell \$20,000+ face value of scrip in a typical month. Our average profit margin is about 7%. Some cards offer a higher percentage, others lower. But that average rate of 7% has been pretty consistent over the past several years.

There's still plenty of potential for growth. Since January 1st, 50% of our profits have come from just <u>seven</u> families! And 20 families have produced 80% of the total profits. The key to further growth is for more scrip buyers to use more scrip! And we've seen plenty of evidence that this has been happening.

Here's an interesting breakdown of recent purchases by customer by category:
77% of all RHCC scrip buyers buy at least some grocery cards
55% buy at least some cards for restaurants, fast food, coffee shops, etc.
44% buy at least some cards for department stores (mostly Target or Walmart)
33% buy pharmacy cards (mostly CVS or Walgreens)

24% buy Amazon cards

23% buy cards for home improvement stores, like Home Depot or Lowes 20% buy travel related cards, like gas stations or hotels

If you are a scrip buyer, are you taking advantage of all of these opportunities?

As you might expect, the summer months are the slowest period of the year for scrip sales. That's obviously a side effect of reduced attendance during the summer months - "out of sight, out of mind." If you are going to be away on a given Sunday, you don't have to forego scrip. You can order scrip by email, and pick it up in the church office during the week (or ask a friend to pick it up for you). In addition to groceries (which you presumably need during the summer as much as the rest of the year), be aware that we offer a variety of travel-related scrip as well – gas cards, restaurants (including fast food), rental cars, some hotel chains, - even Disney! If you have a summer vacation planned, please consider whether you could use scrip to fund some of your travel expenses.

One final note on the scrip ordering schedule for the next few months. For those cards that we don't stock in inventory, we usually place an order at the end of each month. In order to avoid holiday weekends and Hall family vacations, **the "end of May" order deadline will be deferred to June 1**st (with delivery on June 8), and the **"end of June" deadline will be pushed all the way back to July 13**th (delivery on July 20). For those of you who take advantage of those special order opportunities, please plan accordingly.

2. Finances

Michelle Roberts, staff member, continues to collect back payments of thousands of dollars for land-lease agreements with tenants and our USA Affordable Housing Project. She has done an outstanding job which in turn helps our financial situation at the Christian Activities Council. Because the pledges at RHCC continue to decline, the Board of Missions decided to fund just the Adventures in the City program at the sum of \$3,500. For the first time in memory our Missions Board was unable to contribute the \$2,000 to the Christian Activities Council General Fund. While we are forever grateful to the Board of Missions, any contribution from our members will be heart fully accepted.

3. Adventures in the City

Another school year is almost over. During the summer months, this educational program is just outstanding in helping Hartford's kids and youth gain vast knowledge with our excellent curriculum. This year's theme is "Dreams and Careers". Charmaine Simpson, CAC's staff person, works diligently along with AJC's teachers to guide this program.

4. Community Development Initiatives

Under the leadership of Pat Johnson, this program continues to reach out to the community to encourage youth and citizens to become leaders in their neighborhoods. Pat also led a food drive and coordinated the coat drive with Best Cleaners as well as the Jazz and the Arts program.

Finally, as I have mentioned numerous times, the entire Christian Activities Council is blessed by your continued prayers and financial support from our Intermin Senior Pastor Brenda Pelc-Faszcza, Acting Associate Pastor Meghan Young, our Board of Missions, the Diaconate, the Council to all our members.
