You're Invited to an Ecclesiastical Council for Pastor Meghan D. Young Hosted by Rocky Hill Congregational Church, United Church of Christ Sunday, March 16, 2014 at 3 PM Reception following

On Sunday afternoon, March 16, we have the rare Please ioin us! opportunity to participate in an old congregational tradition: an Ecclesiastical Council. The Committee on Church and Ministry of the Hartford Association of the Connecticut Conference UCC is sponsoring the Ecclesiastical Council for Pastor Meghan D. Young, hosted by our congregation. The purpose of the Ecclesiastical Council is to discern Meghan's preparation for and call to ordained ministry. This is the last step in the process toward ordination, pending call, and being granted full ministerial standing in the United Church of Christ. As in the time of our Puritan forbears, clergy and lay people from "neighboring churches" are encouraged to come participate. All members of our church and any clergy and members of local UCC congregations in the Hartford Association are invited to attend. Meghan will give a brief summary of her ordination paper, including comments about her spiritual journey and theology. Following Meghan's presentation, those gathered will be invited to ask questions to help discern her call to ordained ministry in the UCC. A reception, sponsored by the Board of Deacons, will follow.

Meghan joined our church staff in September 2009 and accepted the position of Acting Associate Pastor the following year. In December 2010, our Board of Deacons recommended to the Hartford Association that Meghan be received as a member-in-discernment. This began a process during which Meghan could discern her interest in a call to ministry in the United Church of Christ. Meghan is presently the Acting Associate Pastor for Faith Formation.

The Board of Deacons and Church Council would appreciate your presence and prayers for this important time in Meghan's ministry.



Interim Pastor's Message



Remember, hope is not some vague belief that "all will work out well," but biblical hope is the certainty that things finally have a victorious meaning no matter how they turn out. We learned that from Jesus, which gives us now the courage to live our lives forward from here. Maybe that is the full purpose of Lent. -Richard Rohr

Twice in the church year, we keep of seasons of preparation: Advent before Christmas, and Lent before Easter. They are meant to be spiritual disciplines, time and space for being and doing that help us understand the nature of our faith and the one we follow. In Advent-Christmas, it's Jesus the Word-made-flesh. In Lent-Holy Week, it's Jesus the crucified-yet-risen. Paradox abounds in both. Truths that can't be simply stated or easily understood speak up, asking for our attention.

What I always hope for in Lent is that we will get serious about hope and the paradoxes in which it comes to us. What I mean is that we won't simply see "hope" as the thing we tack on at the end — a happy ending so certain that we figure we don't have to bother with all the rest of it first. If we know that Easter morning will dawn for sure and Christ will once more be risen, alleluia, then why do we need to go through weeks of other stuff ... the solemnity, the reflection, the self-examination, the whole dark ashesto-crosses arc of it? Why not just sing alleluias all the way through? (I once heard a pastor suggest that we drop Lent. "Too much of a downer," he said. Seriously).

I guess the answer to that is because your life and mine are not alleluias all the way through, just like Jesus' life wasn't. If the gospel has anything to say to us, it will have to say it directly to the light-and-dark, up-and-down, joy-and-sorrow mix that we all live in — otherwise, we would know it is not really speaking to us. This is the power of Lent. It makes us listen for the truth about who we are (mortal, tempted, human ones) so that, by the end of it, we can...well, tell the truth about who we are (beloved of God and those for whom the risen Christ lives). In between the two poles of Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday, we follow the whole thing yet again, dark and light, death and life, and remember the sheer power of starting with the truth. That's a different invitation than one to tack on "hope" or "joy" at the end without trying to discover what they mean all along the way.

Biblical hope is the certainty that things finally have a victorious meaning no matter how they turn out, says Richard Rohr. Yes. No matter how they turn out. May we find many ways in this Lenten season to discover the true dimensions of the hope that calls us.

SMALL GROUP OPPORTUNITIES FOR LENT

Join a small group to explore and enrich your faith in new ways during Lent!

1. ART + FAITH.

7 PM – 8 PM, Thursdays, March 13, 20, 27 & April 3, facilitated by Pastor Meghan.

It has been said that creativity requires faith, and that art itself is an incarnational activity. Come and explore scripture and faith through different artistic mediums. Projects will be both group and individual. No artistic skill or experience needed.

Minimum of 4 committed participants required. Maximum of 8.

2. LIVING THE RESURRECTION.

12 PM – 1 PM, Sundays, March 23, 30 & April 6, 13, facilitated by Pastor Meghan.

What does it mean to live a life rooted in the resurrection? We will explore this question, as individuals and a community of faith, through two books: *Daring Greatly & Liberating Hope. Daring Greatly: How the Courage to Be Vulnerable Transforms the Way We Live, Love, Parent, and Lead* offers a powerful new vision that encourages us to dare greatly: to embrace vulnerability and imperfection, to live wholeheartedly, and to courageously engage in our lives. *Liberating Hope: Daring to Renew the Mainline Church* provides concrete and tangible 21st century insight to those churches looking to renew their congregations through hope and optimism rooted in the resurrection. Chapters from these books will be provided before each gathering.

Minimum of 4 committed participants required. Maximum of 10.

3. <u>*R - E - A - C - H* for Lent!</u>

A small-group faith enrichment experience, led by Rev. Brenda, meeting four times during lent.

$REACH = "\underline{R}econfirmation \underline{E}xperience for \underline{A}dult \underline{CH}ristians."$

Confirmation is typically a time in our youth when we get to explore the meanings of the Christian faith and our place within the community of faith, the church. It's a time for wondering, asking, learning, wondering some more, then "confirming" what we believe. Often it culminates in the writing and sharing of a faith-statement: "This is what seems true to me now about my faith, and here are my questions." Adults, however, seldom have the same opportunity to revisit core understandings of their faith and how they have changed through the experiences of adult life, or to put together a faith statement that reflects who they are now, many years after the Confirmation experience of their youth. This small group will be for just that purpose. Meeting four times, it will give participants a chance to do some exploring, reflecting and "reaching" through short readings and group conversation, and then the writing and sharing of faith statements at the end.

Minimum of four committed participants needed.

Two evening options (four Wednesday evenings or four Thursday evenings) and one daytime option (four Tuesdays, early afternoon) will be considered. One will be chosen, depending on strongest preference/ availability of participants. *Please indicate availability and preference of meetings times on the sign-up.*

FROM THE MODERATOR

Ministry, Mission and Money – OH MY!

When Michael and I made a commitment to journey with this congregation nearly 14 years ago, we received information from the church about its operating expenses and stewardship. We were invited to complete a pledge card. It was the first time we encountered the "split" offering amounts: LOCAL and BENEVOLENCE. Confused by the labels, we asked a faithful member of the congregation to explain the "split." He said, "our local budget keeps the lights on and pays the staff. The benevolence budget goes to the Board of Missions—and they use it to help the poor."

More than "Keeping the Lights On"

To describe the church's operating budget as "keeping the lights on" or even "local" is like describing your own family in terms of your street address. Yes, RHCC UCC is blessed to have grand building. But wait...there's more:

Sunday worship is over. The meeting ends. The congregation leaves. The pastors and staff go home. The lights at 805 Old Main Street are turned off (every day!). But being-the-church isn't over. Diane Roth, a Lutheran pastor in Minnesota, says this about the congregation: "They go to families and communities and work. They go to be larger than themselves, to bear witness to something more loving and more gracious than themselves. We gather to encourage one another and bind up each other wounds, but when we go, we go to love the world, and apply God's healing." **WE GO TO LOVE THE**

WORLD, AND APPLY GOD'S HEALING.

The financial ministry of this church is much more than keeping the lights on and staff paid. And, it's much more than designating some of our monies for mission. Rather, we, as a congregation, are fulfilling a theology to use the gifts God has given us--time, talent and money--in the service of continuing Christ's ministry and mission in the world.

One Church. One Budget.

After significant study, discussion and reflection, the Church Council has decided to organize the 2014/2015 budget in a more common way. Instead of preparing separate "local" and "benevolence" budgets, **a single church budget will be prepared.** Preparing one overall budget, decided and adopted by the congregation as a whole, is a well-used practice in most churches.

This more standard way of organizing the budget was jointly proposed with the Board of Missions. Together, we have agreed to represent a single budget--one that supports all of the mission and ministry of RHCC UCC. Just like being the one Body of Christ, our one church budget will reflect the interconnectedness of all of our resources: building, pastors, staff, ministry resources and mission partners.

In response to this approach of organizing the church budget, the Stewardship Committee will represent a single goal for this year's annual pledge campaign. Rather than seeking a split pledge amount, each member or family in the congregation will be invited to pledge a single amount. This approach will bring us closer to treating money as a gift from God. How will the congregation use those monies? That question can be answered by all of us after we have returned those first fruits to God.

But doesn't our church Constitution require two "separate and distinct" budgets? Technically, we still are doing that - as you'll continue to see the traditional Benevolence budget items distinctly broken out as components of the consolidated budget. The Board for Missions will continue to oversee and administer those expenditures just as the Constitution stipulates. The Constitution also says that if a member designates a split of his/her pledge into "local" and "benevolence" amounts, then the church must honor that split. But there is no requirement that members must subdivide their pledges - and based on widespread feedback, we believe that most pledgers would prefer not to have to make that allocation, instead relying on the church body to oversee the most appropriate allocation of all resources in a way that best fulfills our vision of the church's ministries and mission.

"Every dollar in a church budget is a dollar that someone has given freely, driven by a wish for the church to exist. The church budget is a celebration of organized generosity."

How can we help?

- 1) Familiarize yourself with the consolidated budget format when it is released (the Budget & Elections Meeting is Sunday, March 23). We think it's simpler! Treasurer Dave Hall has even included the previous year's budget in the same format—so you can compare it, line-by-line, to the proposed budget. It's all there: staff compensation, building & grounds maintenance, dues and monies contributed to our denominational partners, and mission expenditures: local, national and global.
- 2) **Participate in this year's Stewardship Campaign.** Your decision on how much to pledge is one you make with God. Whatever God has given you, large or small, you are entrusted with that gift. We are called to share what we have, to give back to God what is God's. **Believe. Reach high. Care deeply. Take responsibility.**

COME JOIN THE CIRCLE: Unit 4 – Women of the Resurrection

The resurrection is the central theme of Christianity and winds of hope blow through the Gospel stories that record this miraculous event. The resurrection is a pivot point of faith and for Christians all that happened before and since revolves around this experience. Our self-understanding comes from this incredible resurrection event experienced by the disciples and the early church.

The four Gospels do not give us a single consistent story line about the resurrection. For some this might be distressing. It may help to understand that for the Gospel writers, the truth of the resurrection was a "sure thing." They were not trying to prove that it happened. Instead, they were trying to help readers better understand what God was doing through Jesus' resurrection. They wanted us to see the empty tomb as crucial to faith and life.

During this unit we will read and reflect on the four Gospel accounts of the resurrection, focus on the experiences they describe, explore the gift that the presence of women brought, and open ourselves anew to the miracle of the resurrection.

A Prayer For The Unit. Gracious God, like the women who followed you, we also go to your tomb. When we find it empty, sometimes we are filled with fear, not sure how to move ahead.

Sometimes we are inspired, but we don't think our message is heard by others. Give us physical strength, emotional control, and spiritual depth to be witnesses to what we have seen and heard and learned in you. Help us to share the joy of the resurrection with others and open us to receive their witness too. In your name we pray, Amen.

From the Scholarship Committee

Each year, our church awards college scholarships which are funded by investment returns from the Scholarship Endowment Funds. Applicants should be members of Rocky Hill Congregational Church, active members of one of its youth organizations, or active participants in the life of the church.

Awards are based upon church and community involvement, demonstrated scholastic achievement, financial need, and the completion and submission of a scholarship application form. Scholarships may be awarded for up to four years of undergraduate studies. Recommendations on scholarship recipients are made by the Scholarship Committee, whose members are appointed by the Board of Trustees. This recommendation is then subject to the final approval of the Trustees.

Graduating high school seniors and returning college undergraduates who are seeking a church scholarship for the 2014-2015 academic year should obtain an application from the church office or from the web site, <u>rhccucc.org</u> and may be submitted electronically. Please complete and return it prior to April 15, 2014. Awards will be announced in June.

Frank Roswell Fuller Scholarship

This scholarship requires that you be a member of the UCC/Congregational Church and "professed to be of the Congregational faith." Applications are on the bulletin board in the church office. please call and an application will be mailed to you.

Frank Roswell Fuller was born in Hartford on August 23, 1873 and attended local public schools. He went to New York City and later formed his own company at 40 Wall Street known as Fuller & Company, which operated from 1904 to 1920. When he retired he came to live in West Hartford. He died on March 1, 1957. His will, probated in the Probate Court for District of Hartford, established a substantial scholarship fund. Mr. Fuller was always interested in helping "needy, deserving" students obtain the education that he had not been able to enjoy himself.

Remember to file your FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) to federal processor by March 1. You may obtain a FAFSA application from your high school guidance counselor or at <u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u>.

The deadline for submitting your application and other documents is May 15th.
