Memory is an integral part of who we are. As memory is passed on from one generation to the next, stories become integrated into a family's fabric. Sometimes stories are left untold intentionally, or

altered to cover up an uncomfortable occurrence in the past. Such is the case with the stories about my great great great grandfather who died in Iowa in 1836. He went out there to find a place to resettle his family. He had suffered a huge financial loss while building up his business in Meriden. The family story was that a large amount of money was stolen by an employee. I grew up with that story. My father and I did some research a number of years ago and found the real reason he lost all his money. He was speculating in real estate, a time-honored way of either getting rich quick or losing your shirt. His fate was the latter. He over-extended himself and got caught in the pinch. He wasn't the only one, though. Many people lost money in real estate around that time in the first financial crisis to hit our country. This story was painful and embarrassing enough to cause his brother to invent a different story, placing the blame on a former employee.

I think about this occasionally because it reminds me of the power of stories. Stories shape who we are, and we in turn reshape them as they churn in our minds. We all have our own individual stories that inform us, and we share collective stories. As Christians, we all share the stories about Jesus as told in the New Testament, although we may understand those stories in a very different way.

We all have stories that remind us of painful or difficult experiences in the past. Such stories pop up at inconvenient times. We'd be happy to have them just go away and be forgotten. Stories such as this are awkward, uncomfortable, even painful to remember.

God knows our stories, good and bad. And, God transforms our painful stories through the resurrection of Jesus. The story of Jesus' resurrection shapes our faith. It is a reminder of how God took the pain of the crucifixion and transformed it into a victory over death. This is much larger than just Jesus' own experience. It is our story too. We can look to the power of the resurrection to transform our own pain into a victory over defeat and trial. We are promised that power which is available to us as we ask for God's help.

However the disciples experienced Jesus' resurrection, it transformed them into a group of people with a mission. My prayer is that we will allow this story to transform our lives as well.

If you've taken the elevator here at church recently, you may have noticed a heart sticker near one of the buttons. There is also a heart sticker near the picture of the church on the bulletin board in the main hallway. These stickers were placed by the Pre-K to 1st grade class as they toured the building, looking for evidence of love here at church. Thanks to teachers Candy Smith and Kari Mccaw, they found plenty of love. Most of the stickers were picked up and placed on the children's shoes, a reminder for them to "walk in love." But the other stickers remain, a reminder to us that at least for the children, **RHCC is a place where love abounds**.

On **Shrove Tuesday**, pancakes and sausages and bacon abounded, as the Inreach Committee prepared yet another fabulous feast. About 50 folks gathered to have a Mardi Gras type celebration, complete with a parade and pancake games (with pancake socks given as prizes!). Filled with good fun and good food, we cleaned up from the party, putting away the Alleluia's and thinking about one thing we would want to let go of during Lent. Pastor Craig took our written thoughts, burned them (outside), and used the ashes during the Ash Wednesday service which followed. It was quite meaningful to enter the more reflective time of Lent with those with whom we had just celebrated.

During this season of Lent, my children's sermons will be asking the kids to consider what it means to be on **God's team**. I consistently hear how older kids' sports teams ask them to spend hours and hours every week for the sake of their team. We don't ask the same here at church, but maybe it is time to ask ourselves if even one or two hours per week can be given for the sake of God's team.

- explore the idea that the image of God can be revealed through them and their actions.


Grades 6-8: Justice, Sharing Communion

The time passed quickly and it was satisfying to know our labor resulted in feeding 59 people a healthy, warm, and delicious meal. We received 14 requests for seconds. A number of the guests were homeless, and we were touched by the large family with small children who had made the trek to the church in order to be fed. Thanks to the Missions Board who provided the funds for the meal. Because Center Church is able to work with FoodShare to obtain ingredients for a low price, we were able to use our funds to purchase fresh vegetables for a hearty green salad, something which is not usually available to this clientele. We look forward to doing more dinners in the future.


On February 14, we participated in the Interfaith Youth Hangout at the Islamic Association of Greater Hartford, located at the Berlin Mosque. Everything was planned by the Muslim youth, who hope this will be the beginning of forging peace and understanding among them and their Christian and Jewish cohorts. Rather his work is to accompany or partner with the people of Colombia. Just as Michael's work is to partner with the people of Colombia; we want to partner with the people in our local community as well.

One way that we can do this is through the **Foodshare Walk Against Hunger.** The walk provides support for many pantries and programs in the Greater Hartford Region, including over 42,000 children. The Walk is set for Sunday, May 1st at Liam McGee Park in Hartford. Why I am letting you know this early about the Foodshare walk? 

Rocky Hill Congregational Church Scholarship Information for the 2016-2017 Academic Year



Each year, our church awards college scholarships which are funded by investment returns from the Scholarship Endowment Funds. Applicants should be members of Rocky Hill Congregational Church, active members of one of its youth organizations, or active participants in the life of the church. Awards are based upon church and community involvement, demonstrated scholastic achievement, financial

need, and the completion and submission of a scholarship application form. Scholarships may be awarded for up to four years of undergraduate studies. Recommendations on scholarship recipients are made by the Scholarship Committee, whose members are appointed by the Board of Trustees. This recommendation is then subject to the final approval of the Trustees.

Graduating high school seniors and returning college undergraduates who are seeking a church scholarship for the 2016-17 academic year are invited to complete and return an application prior to April 15, 2016. Scholarship awards will be announced in June. Scholarships to graduating seniors will be presented in the applicant's school awards assembly program. Otherwise, recipients will be notified by letter. Scholarship checks will be paid to the awardee and notification of change of plans or non-attendance should be made to the committee prior to issuance of checks in mid-July and mid-December.



CALL TO THE ANNUAL BUDGET AND ELECTIONS MEETING Sunday, March 13, 2016

The annual Budget and Elections Meeting of the Rocky Hill Congregational Church, United Church of Christ is called for Sunday, March 13, 2016 immediately following worship in the sanctuary for the transaction of the following items of business:

- 1. to vote on the proposed budget for the 2016-2017 fiscal year;
- 2. to approve all special offerings for Missions and Diaconate;
- 3. to vote on the distribution of any undesignated bequests for the 2016-2017 fiscal year;
- 4. to elect church officers and board and committee members for terms beginning May 1, 2016;
- 5. to hear Council sub-committee report of introduction/overview for proposed modifications to church governance structure and function;
- 6. to approve the recommendation of the Fair Committee for expenditure of the proceeds from the 2015 events;
- 7. to approve the dissolution of the Pastoral Search committee as recommended by the Council;
