LENT is a time for reflection on our faith. It goes back to the early church, when new Christians went through a period of instruction before being baptized on Easter. It is modelled after Jesus' time in the wilderness. The number forty is significant. It symbolizes testing. The people of the Exodus wandered the wilderness for forty years.

The escapees from Egypt had Moses as their guide. From what we read in the books of Exodus and Deuteronomy they weren't an easy group to work with. Many times we read of Moses' frustration as he expresses it to God. Jesus' time in the wilderness is also a time of testing. He's on his own for his forty days, but we have John the Baptist as our guide through Lent.

John's ministry frames the beginning of Jesus' ministry. He baptizes Jesus, and he introduces some of his disciples to Jesus. It is quite possible that Jesus was a disciple of John. We'll never know, but I believe there is a back story. I don't think John had never met Jesus when Jesus came to John for baptism. In the Eastern Orthodox Church John is called the "Forerunner," the one who preceded Jesus' ministry. As such he is a very important figure along with Mary the mother of Jesus. In the icon that I will have in the chapel this month you will see John and Mary praying to Jesus.

John also preached to the general population, encouraging people to repent (turn around) and be baptized. We don't know for sure where John got the idea for baptism, but it probably came from the mikvah, the Jewish ritual bath for purification. I saw mikvahs in the Essene monastery near the Dead Sea, the spot where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found. When Gentiles converted to Judaism they went through this ritual bath. This has caused scholars to think that John had a connection to the Essene community. There are similarities in their beliefs. The Essenes saw the Temple as corrupt. John criticized the collusion between the clergy and the Roman occupation. Jesus did as well. Could Jesus have been a part of the Essene community? Maybe.

Having John as a guide during Lent is a good thing. John knew the wilderness well. He would have known where to find water, food, shelter, and other basic needs. He also knew what the wilderness experience could do to people. When you're on your own in a deserted place there is opportunity to think. A lot. We don't always take time to think, or to pray. John's presence in the wilderness encourages us to take that time during Lent, and at all other times.

It is easy to slip into a comfortable faith that reassures us without challenging us. Part of being in the wilderness is the challenge—the challenge to our assumptions, the challenge to our comfort, the challenge to how we live our lives. If we avoid the wilderness at all cost, the cost to us is the depth of our faith. And, in the end, we can't totally escape the wilderness. We've all been through it. Be sure that in your next time in the wilderness you have John as a guide.

As I sit and write this article, it is Chinese New Year's Eve (aka the Lunar New Year). All around the world, Chinese people are making sure their homes are clean and their hair is cut. Tradition has it that if one cleans or cuts during the two-week celebration, one could be sweeping away good fortune. While 21st century Chinese-Americans are apt not to believe such superstition, we are apt to



follow suit anyway. Hence, I am very glad that a couple of months ago, I completed a deep clean of my kitchen. A light touch-up is all that is needed now.

Superstition aside, it really is a great thing to have a regular time for cleaning one's home. It is easy to let clutter get away from us. Rather than seeing the Lunar New Year as a burden, because it means cleaning, it is seen as a welcome anchor point because it means cleaning – and sharing good food and affirming familial bonds and welcoming fresh starts.

Christianity has anchor points throughout the year, which if we are not careful, can swing over to feeling like burdens instead. The season of Lent is one such anchor. It is a time of renewing our relationship with God, of putting energy into our spiritual disciplines (which actually, will yield energy in return). It is easy to let our spiritual lives get away from us. Lent gives us the opportunity to not let that happen.

During Lent, church school will be focused on the discipline of prayer, the Middle School Youth Group will include an act of service and learning about other cultures, and the High School Youth Group will grapple with some issues of the day, which they and their parents have asked for (sexual harassment and gender identity).

Here is our upcoming schedule:

Church School

From March 4-25, the children in Pre-K to 5th grade will be learning about the Lord's Prayer, in a unit called "Teach Us How To Pray." They will discover that:

- the Bible tells us that Jesus was a man who frequently talked with God;
- the disciples were curious about how Jesus prayed;
- Jesus taught the disciples a special prayer;
- Christians today still pray this prayer; it is called the Lord's Prayer;
- talking with God helps us feel closer to God;
- we can talk with God at any time about anything;
- there are many ways to pray.

Grades 6-8 will focus on the following topics: Sharing Communion (The Last Supper), Prayer (Jesus in Prayer), Suffering (Jesus' Betrayal, Arrest, and Trial), Death (Jesus' Death)

Governance Update – Time for Transition



On December 18, the Governance Committee released a final draft of a proposed Constitution in support of our new governance structure. We will vote on this draft at the Budget & Elections Meeting on March 18, following morning worship.

We realize that for many, the topic of governance is a dry one. Over the past few months, we've been talking to some of the current Boards and Committees about transition plans, and it's clear that many members had initially not paid too much attention to upcoming changes. This is not surprising, and is actually one of the reasons that we felt it was important to move toward adoption for the upcoming fiscal year. More "talking" is not likely to meaningfully advance the plan. Instead, we are in the process of organizing a transition process that allows us to learn by doing - rather than by talking –to see what works as stated and what needs to be tweaked. And we do recognize that tweaks will be necessary in the coming year.

The Governance Committee plans to host several second hour sessions. The first was held on February 25th, several weeks prior to the scheduled vote. Assuming adoption is approved on March 18, the second session will be in the spring – possibly in May – laying out the opportunities for Ministry Teams and jump-starting their organization in advance of the coming program year. Meanwhile, we've been speaking with current Boards and Committees to alert them to the pending changes related to their areas of responsibility, and to assist as needed in moving toward an effective transition. The Nominating Committee will also be contacting all currently elected Board and Committee members to let them know how their current positions might migrate under the new structure.

We realize that churches have never been particularly adept at change. But we also accept that a continuance of the status quo is not really a viable option. More than 50 elected positions (under the current Constitution) have been vacant for many years. We need a governance framework that is more streamlined and focused, with the flexibility to allow us to effectively carry out our Christian ministries. We hope that over the coming weeks and months you will seek to understand and support this new model and discover avenues for you to contribute your time, talent, and treasure toward ministries that you find energizing – no matter where you are on life's journey!

One final note.... We use the adjective "final" for this version of the Constitution because there is no opportunity to make changes to this version prior to the scheduled vote in March (since all constitutional amendments must be published 90 days in advance). However, assuming that this draft is adopted in March—and we certainly hope it is--we <u>fully</u> expect to make some changes in the first year, taking into consideration all feedback we've received and adjusting to the issues and ideas that emerge as we begin to restructure ourselves in line with the new framework.

FROM THE TRUSTEES

Our church provides space for many outside groups to meet. We have a long tradition of providing space for educational uses like the Little Scholars Preschool which started as the RHCC Cooperative Nursery School. Several years ago, the Siragu Tamil School started using our classrooms a day each week. The school is an Indian Language School run by parents; the schools teaches the Tamil language and promotes the Tamil culture.



For many years we have provided space for AA groups to meet; recently another support group, CT Hearing Voices Network Group, started meeting at RHCC one evening a week. They provide a safe space for people to share their experiences of voices, visions, unusual sensory perceptions, and to support one another. They are peer support group involving social support and belonging, not therapy or treatment.



SCRIP-SURE

"Still Crazy After All These Years"



For the first nine months of the current fiscal year (i.e.,

since last May 1), we've earned about \$12,000 from the scrip program. While that's down about 9% from the same period last year, it still provides a critical source of revenue to "fund our faith." You might even say that's a "crazy" amount of scrip income for a church of our size.

We started this program in late-2009. As some of you will recall, we celebrated \$1 million in total scrip sales (cumulative face amount) three years ago, in December of 2014. We're now over \$1.8 million cumulatively, and on a pace to reach the second million by late 2018. More importantly, over seven years we've earned more than \$121,000 to support the work of RHCC. And through the scrip program, you've also donated thousands to the Rocky Hill Food Pantry and many other mission projects.

Scrip is sold just about every week in Chapin Hall following morning worship, and we attempt to keep the cards that are actively sold from week-to-week in stock. We also take orders monthly for those gift cards that are not routinely stocked. Those orders are typically placed immediately after the last Sunday of the month. But there may be some shifts in that schedule this spring, due to vacation schedules and travel plans – so please check your email, the weekly bulletin, and/or the newsletter for schedule updates. The next order deadline will be on Sunday, March 25 for delivery on Easter Sunday, April 1.

If you're unfamiliar with our program, please visit <u>rhccucc.org/scrip</u> - or stop by the scrip table in Chapin Hall any Sunday morning during the fellowship period, and we can provide you with information. Or ask anyone that you see standing in line.

THE MINISTRY RESOURCE CENTER AT YALE

She will be given the opportunity to live out her life in dignity and solace in an environment where she feels loved and cared for.



In the coming year, we hope to share more about Mrs. Yangkey. And, we will plan opportunities for our congregation to share its gifts with her, including donations, letters & cards, and small gifts.
