



#### Dear Friends,

The Church Council has approved planning to restructure the current staffing configuration. The decision to advance some staffing changes is timely, following the resignation and retirement of Church Secretary Carol Harvey in April. This planning realigns the staff more closely to the church's mission and vision. Specifically, the position of Church Secretary has been restructured, establishing two new staffing positions: *Minister for Communications* and *Administrative Assistant*. The new positions are intended to staff the church for even more effective ministry. Here is a summary of these two new positions:

#### (a) Minister for Communications

Similar to the Minister of Music, this position can be filled by a non-ordained person. Responsibilities include shaping, developing, and coordinating communications within and outside the congregation. He/she will design and implement a plan for presenting comprehensive and consistent communications across multiple platforms, including worship bulletins, newsletters, calendars, website, social media, email, and external print and electronic media. These communications will convey a public face for RHCC, affirming and advancing a clear and consistent vision of who we are, what we believe, and what we do. She/he will engage the pastors, staff & congregation in this ministry. This is a salaried position (not hourly), one-third time (one-third of an equivalent full-time position).

#### (b) Administrative Assistant

The Administrative Assistant is responsible for supporting the ministry and mission of the congregation by accomplishing tasks associated with day-to-day church operations and workflow. Responsibilities include typing/word processing, greeting and reception, record-keeping, mailing, operating office equipment, coordinating building use, and maintaining calendar. She/he will be a source of welcome and hospitality to all who interact with the church. This is an hourly position requiring 20 hours per week (all year).

#### **Questions and Answers...**

What is a Minister for Communications? "Communication" is a critical component of our life together. It directly reflects how we "tell our story." Sunday bulletins, newsletters, and calendars are just a few ways we "communicate" our story to other church members...and to the world. By enabling a member of the church staff to focus on communications, we give a more coordinated, consistent, and public face to the Spirit-alive at Rocky Hill Congregational Church. In some organizations and businesses, an equivalent position might be named "Communications Manager."

What is the "big picture" goal of this staff restructuring? The two new positions closely align these staff and their responsibilities with the congregation's vision. The restructuring will enable more effective ministry and mission—expanding the church's presence in the world (local, state, national, and global).

What is the financial impact for funding these 2 new staff? The proposed restructuring is designed to be "revenue neutral." The staff expense of the "Church Secretary" is reallocated to funding the two new positions.

When will this staff restructuring occur? Now. This transition time makes this a good time to implement a staffing change.

How was this plan prepared? In August 2012, the Council established a subcommittee to study and make recommendations about the current staffing configuration. This effort followed nearly 3 years of additional conversations about staffing the church for more effective ministry. Numerous models were examined including the staffing configuration of other churches of similar organization and size. The Church Staffing Subcommittee included: Moderator Bob Inderbitzen, Board of Missions Chair Linda Calcagni, Treasurer Dave Hall, Senior Pastor Rev. Donna Manocchio, Council Member At-Large Tom Rolfe, Personnel Committee Chair Kristy Solie, and Acting Associate Pastor for Faith Formation Pastor Meghan Young. The recommendation of the subcommittee was approved by the Council.

# **Sharing Our Joys and Concerns in Worship**

Each week in worship at RHCC, UCC, we have the privilege of raising our joys, gratitude, hopes, and concerns to God. When called upon by the pastor, a person names their prayer aloud – Aunt Sue as she recovers from hip surgery; the joy of a new baby for a neighbor; James returning from serving in Afghanistan. Prayers have been recorded and then appear the following week's bulletin so we can continue to ask for God's presence to be with people and communities on their life and faith journeys.

On Easter Sunday this year, instead of being called upon individually, the congregation was invited to raise their prayers as an alleluia. People named aloud their hopes and prayers, one after another - Elizabeth, Uncle Bob, peace in Korea, visiting family - filling the sanctuary with petitions of praise and hope.

In their evaluation of Holy Week services, the Deacons discussed the time of prayer, and acknowledged it was a beautiful and powerful moment of worship. Because the "Easter way" allows people to raise their prayers in a peaceful and reverent way and continues the RHCC tradition of hearing multiple voices in worship, the deacons decided to use this practice beginning on MAY 5. It will be adapted to include a congregational response to each of the prayers raised aloud, a response suggested by a church member who learned it at another church: "YOUR PRAYER IS OUR PRAYER."

Beginning on May 5, sanctuary worship will include this new practice; our young people have already been using it in their chapel services. Instructions will be listed in the bulletin, and cards will be available in the pews for people to write down their prayer, and if so indicated, the prayers will be listed in the following week's bulletin.

We look forward to the ways that this new practice will call us deeper into the heart of God and form us as a community of worship. Please speak to one of the deacons or the pastors with any questions.

He died on March 1, 1957. His will, probated in the Probate Court for District of Hartford, established a substantial scholarship fund. Mr. Fuller was always interested in helping "needy, deserving" students obtain the education that he had not been able to enjoy himself.

# May 2013: My Yoke is Easy and My Burden Light

"Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart and you will find rest in me."—Matthew 11:29



Seven hours by bus through thunderous rains dousing rice fields and plantations. Another four hours by shuttle scaling the mountain roads revealing garden terraces carved out of the face of the earth taking me to meet with a welcoming group. Then into the back of a jeep which took us another three hours through winding dirt roads passing through mining sites, narrow ridge tops, eventually stopping at the far flung United Church of Christ in the small mountain community of Copcopit. Just the day before a member of the community, Abraham Decoyna,

had died of cancer. We were there to share in the loss with the family gathered in his home, along with the entire community.

The people of Copcopit not only attend church together, they also work together, help raise each other's children, cook together, and mourn together. Unity is regarded as essential in overcoming obstacles or seeing goals met. A break in unity could be devastating. They believe in consensus in everything connected to the community including funeral proceedings: what food to prepare, what clothes to dress the deceased in, and participating in the coffin construction. For four days we shared fellowship with the family. We held worship services each night in the family kitchen and shared meals together. As stories were shared by friends and family, laughter echoed late into the night, and the next morning it started again.

Throughout the week, people gave generously to the family. This is done with every family who suffers the loss of a loved one to lighten and share their burden for the costs of the four-day feasts, hospital bills, remaining debts, and a small amount for the family. Any amount remaining is given to an organization that helps this and surrounding communities during hardships. All in all, there was almost \$3,000 raised. When faced with seemingly impossible odds or dealing with loss, not only does Copcopit have a community of faith to lean on, but they join in sharing the yoke of others. As the community shares the same yoke they share the same burden.

God, we pray for the people of Copcopit, and reflect on their community service and support of each other. Help us to be as generous and kind with our time and treasure.
