As I am sitting in my office working on my sermon I can hear the children in the toddlers' music class that meets upstairs. It occurs to me that these children, who are now about three to four years old, will be adults and on their own in about twenty years, more or less, which would be about 2036. By that point I will be 79 and retired, hopefully

in good health and still active. Many of our current church members will no longer be with us. The world will, however. These children and the world we live in will undoubtedly face challenges we can't even imagine. They will look back on our own time as the good old days.

I think about this as I consider what the church will be like. Will the Rocky Hill Congregational Church, UCC still be here? Or, will this building be an office building or a concert hall? We can't take it for granted that the church will still be here. What we do today will have a direct impact on what the church of the future looks like.

It occurs to me that the church I was ordained into no longer exists—referring not to my home church, Center Congregational Church in Meriden where I was ordained in 1985, but the church as a whole—this church no longer exists. At the time I was ordained the Internet was unknown. Home computers were a novelty, and the only telephones were attached to a wall. There was no Facebook, no eBay, no Amazon.com. That world is gone forever.

It's important to remember that the world as it is will not remain so. New technologies will replace what is in current use. The way we travel may change, or not. The way we communicate will undoubtedly change.

Through all this, the church will remain. What it will be, we don't know. It will remain because in our hearts we know that what we do always remains—building up disciples of Jesus. How we do that will change with the times. The important thing to remember is that what we do never changes. How we do it is always subject to change.

As we continue to work at being Jesus' disciples let's not forget this. Cherished traditions will certainly continue as long as they serve to build on that goal of making disciples.

It's important to remember Jesus' last words to his disciples as recoded at the end of the gospel according to Matthew, as he promises that he will always be with us: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

S.P.I.R.I.T. Church School News

The narrative in John 19:1-21 provides us with examples of how Jesus fed his disciples, and gives us clues as to how to respond to Jesus' wish that we feed his sheep. He fed his disciples actual food; he cooked for them, so they had a hot meal after a hard night's work; he taught them where to put their nets to catch a maximum of fish; he facilitated their gathering together around a common meal. Through fish and bread, he addressed the disciples' physical needs; through cooking for them, he warmed not only their stomachs but their hearts; by teaching them, he improved their minds and their skills; through gathering, he provided them a sense of community and of God's Spirit.

As a youth growing up through the programs at the Presbyterian Church in Chinatown (San Francisco) and its community center, Donaldina Cameron House, I and my peers were encouraged to plan our activities using a four-square model: physical, social, mental, and spiritual. Being youth, we would have chosen all physical and social activities if we could, but being challenged to think of mental and spiritual activities helped us grow and become more well-rounded, not to mention being more well-grounded. Looking back, it is nice to see how this model fit Jesus' own approach.

Through the church school and youth programs here at RHCC, I hope that even as we feed these youngest of Jesus' sheep, they may grow to be well-rounded, well-grounded, and capable of being shepherds, teachers and leaders themselves.



Sound Healing Meditation with Tibetan Singing Bowls with Rev. Craig Cowing Third Friday of the Month, 7pm, May 20

In sound healing meditation, we use the healing vibrations of the singing bowls to uplift the spirit, relax the body and quiet the mind. Singing bowls developed in the region of Tibet a long time ago. A singing bowl is a bronze bowl ranging in size from a few inches to eighteen inches or more in diameter. These instruments have been found to

positively affect the body on many levels. The vibrations soothe the nervous system and invite the release of tight muscles, stress, anxiety, PTSD and depression. Research has been done in the last decade or so about the effects of sound on the mind. It has been found that soothing sounds can actually alter the brainwaves that are produced. The sound of singing bowls definitely has that effect. Come and see what it can do for you, and bring a friend




