By now, some of you may know that the Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island Conferences of the United Church of Christ will meet in Hartford to vote on whether to merge the three conferences. I will be attending this important meeting.

I am in favor of this merger for the following reasons:

- Membership in our churches (in toto) is declining. Churches are giving less to OCWM, and conferences are finding it necessary to retain more and more of that money, meaning the denomination on the national level gets less money. I don't know of a single conference that isn't running deficits year after year. Sharing resources with churches and people in Massachusetts and Rhode Island would be to our benefit.
- A regional conference can be a louder voice and a greater advocate for change in our region. Parochialism has always been an issue in Connecticut as well as the rest of New England, and it will help us to think beyond our state's borders.
- A regional conference would provide more flexibility in terms of staffing, which is important for local churches in the search process or in conflict and in need of mediation by a regional conference minister.

Yes, we need to realize that the traditions and ways of doing things that have guided us in the past are no longer working, and we need to rethink this.

At the Connecticut Conference website (<u>www.ctucc.org</u>) you will find a page entitled "Together, As One – FAQs." An excerpt is below:

Simply put, we believe that God is calling us to greater collaboration, interdependence, and unity. As a united and uniting church, we are convinced that we need each other to navigate the changes we are all experiencing—globally, nationally, locally, and within our congregations. With the Prophet Isaiah, we hear God saying, "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" (Isaiah 43:19). With the Apostle Paul, we believe that "just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ" (1 Corinthians 12:12). With our forebears who created the United Church of Christ, and with Jesus himself, we continue to pray "that they may all be one" (John 17:21). By moving forward Together, As One, we are following the impulse of connection that is part of our DNA as Christians, and we are living out our faith in new ways for a new time.

Our three Conferences have been engaged in a process of discernment and increasing connection for many years. This has included collaboration among Conference staff, sharing of resources (such as Fitness Reviews, Boundary Training, and Racial Justice Training), and creation of joint programs for learning and mission (such as Super Saturday, joint General Synod caucuses, and the RIMACT youth delegations to General Synod and National Youth Event). As we have collaborated, we have discovered the strength and joy that come from pooling our resources and joining with our siblings in Christ to accomplish more together than we can ever do alone.

We have also engaged in an intentional process of discernment. Following several years of increasing collaboration, in November 2014, the three Conference Boards of Directors held a joint meeting, followed by a joint Conference staff meeting in January 2015. In September 2015, the three Boards of Directors voted to enter into a year-long Season of Discernment, which included opportunities for in-person feedback at Association and Conference meetings, Super Saturday, and other events, as well as an online survey. The three Boards and the planning team carefully considered all the input we received as we discerned our way forward, leading to the unanimous votes by the three Boards in January 2017 to move forward in creating a new Conference together.

While staying true to the deep roots of our faith, we are inviting God's Spirit to guide and inspire us in creating a new thing—new patterns and structures that will enable us to make the extravagant love of God known in dynamic and innovative ways, both in Southern New England and beyond. We recognize that the world has changed in the 60 years since Conference boundaries were established at the creation of the United Church of Christ in 1957, and we believe that new ways of organizing ourselves to do ministry together will best serve our local churches as they serve the world in Christ's name.

I look forward to the debate in June, and I hope that a clear, articulated vision will inform how we proceed. I welcome any feedback on this subject, and would like to hear from our members how they feel about this proposed plan.

S.P.I.R.I.T. Church School News

Every now and then, I pull out my books on the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI), the most widely used tool for understanding normal personality differences. These differences can be the source of much misunderstanding and miscommunication. Understanding them instead as that which makes us unique, differentiated human beings can help us be more accepting of ourselves and others.



As an educator, it helps me to remember that children have these differences as well. For example,

- Some children prefer to get careful, complete instructions before they begin a new game or task.
- Some like to observe others playing with a toy before they try it themselves.
- Some like to plunge in right away and learn as they go along.

Appreciating these differences in children makes me appreciate the different gifts our church school teachers bring, and how having teams of teachers available for each class improves our chances for reaching each unique child.

Frank Roswell Fuller Scholarship

Frank Roswell Fuller was born in Hartford in 1873 and attended local public schools. He later formed his own company at 40 Wall Street known as Fuller & Company, which operated from 1904 to 1920. When he retired he came to live in West Hartford. He died in 1957. His will established a substantial scholarship fund. Mr. Fuller was always interested in helping "needy, deserving" students obtain the education that he had not been able to enjoy himself. The deadline for submitting your application and other documents is **May 15**th.
