## The Church Mouse

### From the Interim Senior Pastor

This is true joy in life, the being used for a purpose recognized by yourself as a mighty one; the being a force of nature instead of a feverish little clod of



ailments and grievances, complaining that the world will not devote itself to making you happy. I want to be thoroughly used up when I die, for the harder I work, the more I live. I rejoice in life for its own sake. Life is no 'brief candle' to me. It is a sort of splendid torch which I have got hold of for the moment, and I want to make it burn as brightly as possible before handing it on to future generations. -George Bernard Shaw

It's one of the great phrases of all time -- "a feverish little clod of ailments and grievances." Complaining that the world will not devote itself to making us happy. Ah, yes, who among us can't recognize ourselves there? We may not be feverish little clods all the time, but pretty much everybody is there some of the time. *The world is here for me, why isn't it doing/being exactly what I want?* 

That's the way we think when we think like consumers. The assumption of a consumeristic mindset is that everything is here *for us.* For our use, for our enjoyment, for our benefit, for our desires. Looked at that way, it's easy to see how we can become those little clods of demand and complaint, since many things in the course of a day, and a lifetime, do not yield to our demands or wishes at all -- not things, not people, not circumstances. Hence the "grievances."

There is an antidote to consumeristic living and thinking. It is generosity. It is gratitude. It is faith. It is spirit. It is love. It is compassion. It is the gospel. It is living into the world as participants and contributors: as givers, instead of takers. It is, in George Bernard Shaw's words, "the being used for a purpose recognized...as a mighty one," the desire to live fully, abundantly, mindfully, and turned outward toward what is around us. Or, to put it another way, living as part of the web of God's creation, rather than living only in little worlds of our own making.

What if we saw thanksgiving (or Thanksgiving) as being not all about what we have accrued to ourselves, or what good fortune has fallen our way, but about living within the realm of God and *knowing* that we live within the realm of God, part of a large and sacred purpose, no matter what is happening... "rejoicing in life for its own sake"...? It would be hard to be clods, if we were seeing like that.

#### **Church School**

## FINANCIAL UPDATE

You've no doubt heard that our pledge campaign fell well short of its goal, both on the local and benevolence sides. I thought it was important to convey how this shortfall is impacting current church finances on the local side.

Our fiscal year began on May 1<sup>st</sup>. For the first five months of the fiscal year, we collected total income (pledge receipts, unpledged gifts, fundraising revenue, investment income, & building use fees) totaling \$116,600. That's about \$13,000 less than what we collected during the same period last year. Compared to our budget, essentially all of the shortfall is in pledged income.

For this same five month period, we've paid local operating expenses of \$129,400. That's a little below the pro-rata budget, mostly because we've had some shortages in custodial and administrative staff. But total spending is still well above what we've collected.

As Treasurer, I must manage the cash flow to make sure we have the cash available to pay our bills. And since we've collected about \$13,000 less than we've spent, I've turned to our fallback resource – the general Memorial Fund, which is our primary endowment. It still has a balance of about \$880,000 – so we are not in danger of going broke anytime soon. But the path we are on is not a sustainable one for the longer term, and we'll either need to find additional income, or else we'll need to cut expenses. Or both.

Our primary fundraising activities are the Fair and the Scrip-Sure program. By the time you read this, we'll know the Fair results for the current year. But there is still more potential to be realized from Scrip – both from additional purchases by current customers, and from getting more church members involved in this critical fundraising effort. We budgeted total fundraising revenue for the year of \$27,000. It's not yet clear whether we'll achieve that, fall short, or exceed it.

On the expense side, the Trustees are looking at possible ways to save, including energy, insurance, and information technology. But these savings are unlikely to yield much, at least relative to the size of our operating gap. Our biggest expense is staffing. Budgeted salaries and benefits total almost \$250,000 annually. That's a little more than 75% of our total local operating budget. In order to make ends meet, staffing cutbacks will need to be "on the table". I don't mean to suggest that anything is imminent, of course. But as the Council begins to plan for the next budgeting cycle, it's unlikely that we can continue our usual practice of simply forecasting the status quo.

There's work to be done!

It was my privilege to attend the UCC Annual Meeting on October 18 and 19. The only unfortunate thing was that I was not able to attend the Church Fair. Everything else was wonderful. The delegates voted to support labeling of genetically modified foods, universal preschool and expanding the ONA to included gender identity and expression. I met with individuals over lunch and learned about Green churches and how that can save money. There was a great key note speaker who enlivened the assembly with his talk on reviving churches. And the liturgy was awesome. All in all, it was a wonderful experience and I can't wait to share it with this community. Thanks for allowing me to represent you.
