From Listor's Desk

Recently in Massachusetts I saw an odd sight in the parking lot of a convenience store. It was a pole for a phone booth with lights at the top. There was only one problem—the phone booth was gone but the blue sign

saying "Phone" was still attached to the pole. We all know that with the advent of cell phones the public phone booth has become obsolete. I saw a couple recently in California, and it surprised me. I haven't seen a public phone in years, as I think of it.

The phone pole struck me as funny because the phone wasn't there but the sign pointing to it was. It made me think of the changes that have happened in our world in our lifetime. I have often marveled that in my parent's lifetimes they went from auto mobiles that had to be cranked and telephones that also had to be cranked to cell phones and travel in outer space. In my own lifetime we have gone from mainframe computers that ran the early missions to the moon, to smart phones (which are actually small computers) that are many times more powerful than the computers that ran the lunar missions.



We all know the world is changing, and at times I wish the change would slow down. It is easy to look for vestiges of the past, which sometimes is ignored in the rush to continually miniaturize computer

chips so that more capability can be crammed into the same size of chip. The world is in a rush, and often the rush to make progress leaves people behind. Many in our society look for the latest permutation of the Iphone while thousands of children die each day of starvation and disease. When the world progresses it does not do so evenly, for all people. There's still work for the church to do.

In our faith we have many things which point toward something else. The familiar symbols give us comfort. At times those symbols themselves can become outdated and lose meaning, such as the blue phone sign on the pole. I can imagine a modern teenager looking at the sign and wondering why the word "phone" would be on it. Perhaps not. Maybe they would have heard about public phones from their parents.

The phone sign on the pole looks to the past. It's helpful to have signposts that remind us of where we have come from, but more than ever we need signposts that point us toward the future. They're around, but we have to look for them. The important thing is to not mistake one for the other, to mistake a feeling of nostalgia for a direction for the future. Let's keep looking together as we see the present unfolding into the future, where God will be waiting for us!

ICON OF THE MONTH – NOVEMBER

The icon of the month for November is a copy of a ca. 1300 icon painted in Constantinople. The original is at the Monastery of St. Catherine at Mt. Sinai. This icon depicts the three Hebrews in the fiery furnace (Daniel 3), Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, who refused to worship the golden statue made by King Nebuchadnezzar. This scene has become an archetypal image of God delivering the faithful from trials. The text around the icon describes the scene. *Visit anytime for prayer and contemplation in the Weil Chapel.*

In the last two newsletters, I shared with you the faith statements of two of this year's confirmands. The remaining two are exercising their right to not have their statements published. (I think they're shy about it). Those of you who heard their statements in person have remarked on how well done and inspirational they were.

Instead, I will share with you a perspective that these confirmands developed during our mission trip to Louisiana. They have spoken about how the trip helped create a sense of teamwork among group members. The word "teamwork" is natural to use, especially since some of the work projects truly required youth working together, as a team, to accomplish a task. But once the tasks were done, we played together, ate together, worshipped together, shared thoughts together – there were no tasks to accomplish, but we were still functioning by being together. "Teamwork" comes partway in describing these aspects of our trip, but there is another word that I think could bring us even closer.

Boston University practical theologian Courtney Goto articulates this well:

"The formation of groups is cultivated intentionally in fields such as business, athletics, and science – where learning and working as a team are essential. Religious education is similar but slightly different, particularly in the values we hope to impart to learners (in this case, love). Instead of building "team spirit," I am advocating communal formation in which learners challenge implicit assumptions by relating to one another (and others, in this instance) vulnerably and authentically, which I am symbolizing as love. In secular frames of reference, teamwork is often for the purpose of producing a tangible product – for example, a marketing plan, a championship, or a scientific discovery. In religious education, embodying what a community hopes and imagines for itself in light of faith is both the means as well as the end."

The mission trip was important for not only developing teamwork which accomplished tasks, but also for developing <u>community</u> built on authentic relating, and woven together by love. This, I believe, is the distinguishing factor of faith-based mission trips which inspires participants to proclaim how much their lives have been changed by the experience, even though they may not, at the time, recognize it as such.

And so, I am grateful that our youth have publicly stated that they would like to go again on a mission trip, and that our congregation is willing to support them. Next year's trip will be to Pipestem, West Virginia from July 8-14, 2018. We will be working with the Appalachian South Folklife Center.

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Church School

From November 12 to December 3:

Pre-K to 5th graders will be learning about stewardship, through a unit called "Money and Time." They will have the opportunity to learn that:

- there are many ways for us to use our talents, time, and money to serve God;
- all that we have comes to us as a gift from God;
- stewardship is an important part of living as a follower of Jesus;
- stewardship means being a good manager of all God has given to us;
- as good stewards, we are to take care of the gifts God has given to us and use them to serve others;
- talents are the skills and abilities that we have to offer in service to God;
- giving gifts of our time and talents is worth just as much to the church as giving gifts of money or possessions.

6th-8th graders will be discussing the following topics: Encountering God, God's Faithfulness, God's Triumph, Hope

Missions Update:

2017 Hurricane Relief

THANK YOU! Contributions to our church's "2017 Hurricane Relief" fund topped \$7,099. These monies will support the disaster ministries of our covenantal partners who are meeting the needs of survivors throughout the Southeast U.S. and Puerto Rico, and the other Caribbean islands: cleanup, repair and reconstruction of homes, tools, building materials, community organizing, mental health and spiritual care. The donations have been distributed as follows:

- Church World Service (CWS) = \$1,666.81
- Global Ministries = \$2,073.41
- United Church of Christ, Disaster Ministries: \$2,000
- Supplies for the CWS Emergency Cleanup Buckets = \$1,359.71

SCRIP-SURE: November-December Schedule

November and December are the two busiest months for scrip sales. Some of that is because many of us buy gift cards to give as Christmas gifts. But an even bigger opportunity is to use scrip to fund some of your own Christmas shopping. If you'll be shopping at Walmart, or Toys R Us, or Macy's, or J.C. Penney, or L.L. Bean, or Amazon, or Home Depot, or Lowes, or Kohl's, or any of the other hundreds of retailers available through our scrip program, then you can buy scrip for those retailers and use it to pay for your Christmas shopping.

Over the past three years, we earned 60% more in the months of November and December than in the other months of the year. Of course, we'll continue to stock the usual cards in inventory. But if prior years are an indication, you'll be ordering a lot of cards that we don't usually stock. Therefore, to support your extra shopping needs, we'll be placing scrip orders on the following dates:

E-cards are also available from many retailers, so if you don't get your order placed in time, you can often get a digital gift card emailed to you within minutes of your request. Notable retailers offering e-cards include Amazon, L.L. Bean, Barnes & Noble, Kohl's, Home Depot, Bed Bath & Beyond, Best Buy, Gap/Old Navy, and Staples.
