"Repair"

On YouTube, I recently saw a video of workers repairing the famous "Christ the Redeemer" statue that stands high over the city of Rio De Janeiro, Brazil. The Christ figure is almost 100 feet tall, not counting the pedestal, and the outstretched arms go for 92 feet. It



was completed in 1931, a figure of blessing over a city that now numbers almost 6 million. Over the years, it has been damaged several times by lightning, including fairly recently, so that various restorations and repairs have been necessary. Kudos to those human beings who aren't afraid of heights and can do such work.

When I first saw the title of the video, "The Repair of Christ the Redeemer," it struck me as a metaphor. It reminded me that in a far larger sense than one statue, we in the contemporary church are engaged in what we might think of as "repair of Christ" work. That is, we are seeking to do the work of reinterpreting Jesus and his church and the God whom he makes known for a modern world that often has all the wrong idea about who and what they are. We are repairing an image that's been damaged, a theology misconstrued. The research keeps showing that the majority of younger people think churches – all of them – are narrow-minded, judgmental, self-righteous, homophobic, anti-science, and stuck in the past: unyielding places where a rigid moralism and a punitive God are preached. Such a Jesus, such a God and such a church are of no interest to those who have come of age in a pluralistic time that values openness, respect for otherness, a basic trust in science to tell us about the world, and a high regard for the authenticity of the individual conscience and the individual journey. None of which, for them, contradicts the basic outlines of community.

In the UCC, we would see ourselves (I think, I hope) as already being, on the whole, the kind of church in which people with the latter values (no matter their age) could be at home. We would say that a judgmental, narrow, exclusivist, you'll-burn-in-hell Jesus is a damaged-image Jesus -- that that's not who he really is or what he ever taught. That doesn't mean we don't wrestle with some of our

core theological values sometimes, in their particular applications. But generally speaking, we aim to be the kind of open, seeking church that many contemporary people say they would welcome. The thing is, they often just don't seem to know we're here, or what kind of Jesus we already proclaim. Jesus and Christianity have been so damaged by other portrayals and versions of them that now, for many it's easy to assume that all churches must be pretty much alike. Then they say "no thanks."

If we think that Jesus needs repairing in the modern world, then that would be our work. We need to become the work crew, doing what is necessary to restore a rightful and true understanding of the one we follow and his message for those who would live as though they know they are living in the Kingdom of God. So often, what one would hear in our church on any given Sunday morning, or at other times, is not what people who don't know us assume they would hear. But absent countering knowledge, assumptions live on. It's up to us to get our message and our identity more effectively known, more widely recognized. The very words "Jesus," "God," "church," "religion" stand damaged in our culture, and that is one reason why churches have fewer people attending them than they used to. A certain kind of religion is being rejected. More repair is needed.

It just so happens that RHCC is the only UCC church within the towns of Rocky Hill, Wethersfield and Cromwell. So this is the only congregation within that geographical pocket that sits poised to offer, share, interpret and cultivate the kind of theological ground that is particularly United Church of Christ. What might that mean for this church in the coming months and years? How could the reaching out be done? How could we let people know the kind of gospel ("good news") they would encounter here, and the kind they wouldn't? What repairing do we need to be about?

We won't have to climb up 100 feet to do that work....but we will have to make an effort. A lot is at stake.

New Consecration Sunday

CONSECRATION SUNDAY IS COMING

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes. Our congregation's the Stewardship Committee has selected New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. *New Consecration Sunday* encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world. Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card. We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship. We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and Church Council members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

"Heroes of the Bible"

Heroes of the Bible. There is Daniel, Jonah, Joshua, Noah, David, Miriam and Moses, Esther, Jesus, Peter and John, Dorcas, Paul, Lydia, and many more. There are also those that don't even get a name, men and woman who have great faith, who ask difficult questions, who speak up for justice, and even a child who shares his lunch so 5000 can be fed. The heroes of the bible are never perfect people, they make mistakes, they are human, but when it matters they are brave, compassionate, giving, and have great faith. The heroes of the bible are often unexpected, teaching us that the ordinary can be extraordinary, and with God's love all things are possible.

Ordinary and Extraordinary Heroes. Over the next two months, talk about what it means to be a hero. Look for heroes during your daily routines. Look for heroes in news stories. Look for heroes in the Bible. Some might be obvious, but often heroes offering small acts of kindness, standing up for justice when no one will, or sharing their gifts, are over-looked. Discuss the challenges heroes face. Discuss what makes them heroes. As a goal, talk about one hero a day. List the qualities you think makes a hero. Then on October 26th, come to church school dressed as your favorite hero from the Bible.

From the Treasurer: How to Request an Expense Reimbursement

Each year, a number of you spend your own money on church related items – typically related to board or committee work - and then seek reimbursement. That's fine, as it's often the most expedient way to get things done. If you need to be reimbursed for a church expense, here's my preferred list of ways to go about it:

Preferred approach: Send an email to <u>treasurer@rhccucc.org</u>, and if applicable, copy your board or committee chairperson – just to keep him or her in the loop. In your email, include the amount, the payee name, and the mailing address. Typically, the amounts in these requests are modest, and if so, I really don't need a copy of your receipt. If you want to include a scanned receipt, though, that's fine. Or you can follow up by leaving a receipt in my church office mailbox. But usually, I won't need it. And if I do want it, I can always ask.

Second choice: Leave a written note in my church office mailbox. (If you can't get into the church office, you can leave an envelope marked to Dave Hall in the wall box just to the right of the office door.) Again, please indicate who the payment should go to, and provide a mailing address.

Least preferred option: Hand your request to me when you see me. But be warned, *I'll probably look annoyed if you do this* – as this is the best way to have your request lost or misplaced. Your request may go through the laundry, or get lost in the clutter on the top of my dresser at home. Regardless, if you insist on doing this, please be sure to indicate who I should pay, and provide a mailing address. Every now and then I'll find a receipt in my pocket that leaves me puzzled about who gave it to me, or what I'm supposed to do with it. You should assume that I'll forget anything you say to me when you hand it to me – because I probably will.

Regardless of how you request it, a reimbursement check is typically sent directly from Webster Bank, so if you are expecting a reimbursement and you get an envelope from Webster Bank, please don't assume it's junk mail and discard it unopened. (It's happened more than once!).

SCRIP-SURE: UPDATE AND UPCOMING SCHEDULE

Summertime can be a tough period to generate momentum in many church activities, and our Scrip-Sure program is no exception. Yet we still managed to exceed \$1000 in profits for each of the summer months. Fifty members and friends bought almost \$53,000 of scrip (face value) during the summer. And through the first four months of the fiscal year, we've booked \$5000 in income, which is about 9% better than the same period for the year before. Thanks to all who have persisted in supporting this important fundraiser.

If you are one of those who tends to order scrip at the end of each month – which is the only time you can get scrip from retailers that we don't typically keep in inventory – then please note a slight shift in our upcoming schedule. The end of September ordering deadline is on September 28, as usual. But the "end of October" order will be deferred until November 1st. Cards ordered by November 1 will be available for pickup on November 8.

Unfortunately, it was brought to the Board member's attention that one particular condo on Edgewood Street has significant problems. Adventures in the City: This program continues to impact Hartford children and youth. Liberty Christian Church, Grace Lutheran Church, Rawson Elementary and Maria Sanchez Elementary Schools were sites utilized this year plus several programs.

The Hartford Foundation for Public Giving, our largest funder at \$45,500, requested we offer a special program for children and youth in East Hartford. 84 children were served.

Total children and youth served were 959. Educational components including math and reading were conducted in the morning. Enrichment programs in the afternoon consisted of drama, music, and various sports.
