The term “white supremacy” has returned to public discourse after the riot in Charlottesville, Virginia that left one innocent person dead. Related terms have arisen that seem intended to soften the core ideas of white supremacy, such as “white nationalism” and “white identity.” The core idea is that people of European ancestry, specifically northern European ancestry, are genetically superior to all other people and deserve special treatment in society.

This idea has been around for centuries but in its modern form it dates from the 19<sup>th</sup> century. In the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, just prior to the Civil War, a political party called the “Know Nothing” Party developed as an anti-immigrant force in American politics. It didn’t last long but the effect did. After the Civil War the ideology of the “Lost Cause” developed in the former Confederate states, in which the idea of a sort of chivalric nobility replaced the reality that southern society supported and profited from a system of slavery that held people in involuntary servitude based on race. This idea is still strong in the south.

American white supremacy also feeds off the ideas of anti-Semitism, which reached its most destructive form in the Nazi regime in Germany, which emphasized the value of a pure Arian race. Both threads feed into modern white supremacy, with some groups sometimes emphasizing one aspect or another.

There are many white supremacist groups in the United States, most notably the Ku Klux Klan, which was founded just after the Civil War to intimidate freed slaves. This intimidation worked, and former slaves found themselves working as sharecroppers on their old plantations, in a system that kept them in poverty.


Christianity also plays a significant role in white supremacy as it appears in American society and politics today. Specifically there is an appeal to white Protestantism as the true religion of a white America.

It’s important to be clear that white supremacy uses a warped form of Christianity to bolster a fantasy view of a past that never existed. It is not Christian, even though it claims to be. Such hatred and exclusionary ideologies have no place in the church and it is important to resist such viewpoints whenever possible. It’s common that people who look to the Bible for justification for their exclusive ideologies, and if they pull verses out of context they will find them. It is important for the Church to stress the overarching theme in the Scriptures of God’s love which excludes nobody. Only this love has the power to resist hatred.

## Missions Update



Happy Anniversary to Us! It's been 5 years since our church was designated a Global Mission Church – a commitment to God's world through prayer, education, and mission. Thank you all for helping us continue to live and grow our commitment to mission outreach HERE, NEAR, and FAR.

- In July, Minister for Children and Youth Georgette Huie led 6 of our youth on a mission trip to New Orleans, where they supported home rebuilding and repair projects. The Board for Missions committed \$1,400 of missions funds to help offset the cost of their trip.
- In September, our congregation responded with PRAYER and ACTION to support our sisters and brothers impacted by the devastating hurricanes and flooding throughout the Southeastern U.S. and Caribbean. Two prayer vigils were organized. The Board for Missions committed \$2,000 of existing missions funds to UCC Disaster Ministries, earmarked for “2017 Hurricane Relief.” These monies will support the immense recovery efforts: cleanup, repair and reconstruction of homes, tools, building materials, community organizing, mental health and spiritual care. And, as this is written, another \$4,000 has been raised from church members and friends. The Board for Missions will divvy these monies for hurricane relief projects organized by Church World Service (assembling “emergency cleanup buckets”), and Global Missions. Thank you for your generosity!
- The following additional contributions were made over the summer:
  - **\$188.27 – World Wildlife Fund.** This contribution matches a previous contribution made to WWF, collected by our church school children. WWF supports efforts to conserve the world's wildlife and their homes.
  - **\$676 – One Great Hour of Sharing.** This annual collection supports our United Church of Christ (UCC) in disaster, refugee/immigration, and development ministries throughout the world.
  - **\$3,310 – Connecticut Conference per capita contribution** (\$10 per member). These monies help sustain the work of our conference and national settings of the UCC.

## S.P.I.R.I.T. Church School News



Here is the second installment of this past year's confirmands' faith statements. Kaedryn's was the second one in my Inbox, and with her permission, it is printed below. I deeply appreciate Kaedryn's focus on her promise to God and the trust she places in God's promises to her (and to all of us). It is clear her promise is not empty; she has been and fully intends to live her life as defined by this promise. May we be as mindful of and grateful as she for God's abiding presence and care. May we be as true as she to the promises we have made to God and one another.

As you will see, Kaedryn was quite comfortable using the pronoun "He" to refer to God, as most have done for centuries. Given that today's young people (and the UCC) are becoming more aware of and sensitive to those for whom neither "he" nor "she" are a fit, I was musing (to myself) as to whether or not non-gendered descriptions of God would likewise become more mainstream. Just as individuals are increasingly being allowed to define for themselves the pronouns they wish to be called by (some prefer "it" or "they" because they identify as neither male nor female, or physically have traits of both), would God's self-definition in Exodus 3:14 ("I Am Who I Am") be understood today to be a preference for non-gendered descriptions, or for inclusion of all genders when referring to God? In any case, I am quite sure God's ultimate preference is for relationship with all creation, so let us take care that the limitations of our language not interfere with that. And so, may Kaedryn's words lead us to a deeper and more committed relationship with God:

"Throughout this confirmation experience, I have learned many things about myself and my faith. I now have a better understanding and appreciation of the many gifts that God has given us for which to be grateful. Although He does not prevent suffering, He is always there when we need His support. He is always forgiving and nonjudgmental, regardless of the situation. My promise to God began when I was baptized, and I renew this promise through Communion every month. I now continue to follow through with this promise as I become confirmed. I also uphold this promise to God through acts of worship and service. I extend this into my everyday life by volunteering in my town community. My confirmation ensures that I will continue to live my life thanking God for his grace and forgiveness through worship. God presented Jesus as an example of His presence. Jesus led by example, teaching us what it means to be a Christian. The values I have learned through my confirmation journey have helped me to be a better Christian in all aspects of my life. He lives in us today to guide us all on our paths of discipleship. God will continue to guide me through life using the stories of Jesus in the Bible as an example, and I trust that whatever questions I have will be answered through Him. I

The High School Youth Group will go Go-Karting (Oct. 1) and help with the church's Country Fair (Oct. 21) and Roast Beef Dinner (Oct. 28).


## Country Fair News






### Silent Auction Seeking Helpers and Emergency Assistant

Items accepted:




