Recently John Dorhauer, the President and General Minister of the United Church of Christ, announced a new initiative for the next two years leading up to General Synod 2019: The Three Great Loves":

Love of Neighbor Love of Children Love of Creation

These three aspects of love are not new. They are rooted in Scripture and especially the teachings of Jesus. One love is noticeably absent: love of self. Our culture often emphasizes the importance of our loving ourselves, sometimes at the expense of others. It is clear that Jesus believed it to be important that we love ourselves, but he also taught that it was more important to love others.

The United Church of Christ has a vision of a just world for all. In this world all are welcomed, everyone is loved and justice is inherent. The 3 Great Loves is the denomination's opportunity to express how our Love of Neighbor, Love of Children, and Love of Creation work together to address the inequities in our current world.

Beginning at Synod 2017 and ending at Synod 2019, through the lens of the 3 Great Loves, the United Church of Christ in its many settings of ministry will discern and lift up how we act upon these 3 Great Loves. As we do so, we will tell the story of how we are impacting and transforming the world, as covenantal partners united in common purpose and mission.

During these upcoming two years, there will be moments of special invitation to participate in this denomination-wide undertaking. One by one we will focus on each of the 3 Great Loves in service to our communities.

The UCC's General Minister and President, the Rev. Dr. John Dorhauer, recently wrote, "The world is in need of our great love. And our love for the world can transform it."

Where is your heart? Where are you already responding to the love of Children, Neighbor, and Creation in your own life and witness?





Where is your heart leading you to deepen your commitment to one of these Great Loves?

Who else is being led in the same direction?

FORWARD in FAITH

S.P.I.R.I.T. Church School News

As we begin a new academic year here at RHCC, I'd like to make available for you the inspiring faith statements from this past year's Confirmation Class. Four high schoolers: Frank DiRenzo, Emily McKenna, Julia O'Connor, and Kaedryn Pulling, attended the sessions led by Pastor Craig, who also invited me to lead two of the sessions: one on Interfaith matters and one on Sin and Grace. Faithfully and actively accompanying the youth were their adult mentors: Jim Stevens, Candy Smith, Sarah DiGiovanni, and Liz Reed-Swale. I find in the youth's words hope and inspiration, and affirmation for all our efforts in Faith Formation.

Julia's was the first to reach my Inbox, so here it is (with her permission). What I find significant in her statement is her expressed intentionality about participating in church activities and in being curious and open to learning more about her faith, resulting in new insights and benefits. May her words lead us to choose likewise, and may we be as open as she to all that God has in store.

"During confirmation classes over the past 7 months, we discussed a number of topics, and I have come to understand valuable principles of the United Church of Christ, one mainly being the act of discipleship. I learned that true discipleship is living life to the fullest with love for others and myself, seeking ways to act with integrity under the grace of God, and reaching out to all people of different cultures and life experiences with love. During this time, we were exploring who we are and what our faith means to us. Often, that meant that many of our questions went unanswered, and the bottom line was a need to have faith.

During these past few months, I worked to make my faith real through conscious actions and choices. One of the ways I worked to accomplish this was by involving myself in church worship and youth activities, such as being a speaker on Maundy Thursday, contributing to the music ministry on Easter Sunday, giving to the church through the offering and ushering, donating to the Walk for Hunger, participating in the youth group trips to the soup kitchen at Center Church in Hartford, and helping my father deliver Easter flowers to homebound members of the church. These actions helped me along a path to becoming a follower of Christ, and allowed me to think more about and become closer to God. In many ways, I learned throughout this journey that believing in God means to have hope and love, and to want what is best for yourself and others as a community.

I grew up here in this church, and my life experiences, including the time taken during the confirmation process, have helped me understand that believing in God can provide a sense of comfort, protection, and strength. As long as you have faith, you are never truly alone. One of the questions I often asked myself throughout this journey was "What would Jesus do?" In many ways, it would be easy to choose to be negligent towards other people's needs or to be selfish in using my time for pleasure rather than aid. But, in asking myself this question, it shed a new light on situations and helped me to become a better person. For example, on several occasions, I visited the Berlin mosque to attend interfaith youth hangouts and learn more about the Islamic faith. This was especially beneficial to me because a fear of many people in our country is that all Muslims are to blame for the violent actions of minority extremist groups who commit crimes in the name of their faith. I learned through meeting members of the Islamic community, that they are a peaceful people and share many of the compassionate qualities that Christianity focuses on.

As a result of the Confirmation journey, I have learned not to be so judgmental of others based on my first impression of them. I came to better understand that God has graced us all with individual and unique gifts, and that what a person looks like, wears, or owns doesn't make them any better or worse in God's eyes - so who am I to judge them? One of the subjects we focused on throughout our studies was forgiveness. One of the ways people can demonstrate their faith and discipleship is by following the example of Christ. Christ offers forgiveness and the chance to accept it again and again, and reaches out to people with love. The inability to accept God's forgiveness can result in missed opportunities to welcome the love of God into your life. I learned that in being a believer of God, you have to recognize and be appreciative of every opportunity and gift that comes your way, and that people who do this seem more contented in the quality of their lives. I am beyond grateful for this church community, the dedication of our confirmation mentors, and the opportunities the confirmation process has given me to affirm my faith and become more of a disciple."

This year....

- There will be a Confirmation Class for 9th graders (and any 8th or 10th graders who may wish to join in).
- The Middle School Youth Group will begin with an organizing meeting on September 10.
- The High School Youth Group will begin with an organizing meeting on September 17.
- Church School classes will be at the same grade levels: 6-8 (middle school), 2-5, and Pre-K to 1st and will meet in the same rooms, beginning September 17.
- All children and families are encouraged to attend the Re-Covenanting Sunday worship on September 10: the high schoolers will be reflecting on the mission trip during the sermon time.

From September 17 to October 8:

Pre-K to 5th graders will be learning about Moses in a unit called "Out of Egypt". They will:

- identify the Exodus as the defining event in the lives of the Hebrew people;
- discover that God wants all people to be free, to be treated with respect, justice, and kindness;
- recognize that, like person of Bible times, they are called by God and can respond to God's call in many different ways;
- be assured that they can trust God's guidance and God's care and know that God is always with them;
- be shown how God can work through people to accomplish God's work on earth;
- discuss how God is present with people in the world today, even where there is suffering and trouble;
- be reminded that they can turn to God when they are troubled or afraid, and know that God hears and cares.

6th-8th graders will be discussing the following topics: Trusting God, Forgiveness, Reconciliation, and God Providing.

Christian Activities Council September Report

<u>Freedom Schools – Adventures in the City:</u>

Once again, the Christian Activities Council and our staff made a profound impression on children from Kindergarten through Third Grade in North Hartford. Thurman Milner, the first African American Mayor in Hartford read to the children. This outstanding program enables children to advance their skills in reading or maintain their current levels. I would like to personally thank all the wonderful people who are dedicated to the children and Freedom Schools' curriculum. The following was written by Pastor Craig Cowing:

On Thursday August 3rd, I attended the Finale for the Christian Activities Council-sponsored "Adventures in the City." This school is based on the Freedom School model, which affirms children of color. The children who took part were from families who could not otherwise afford a summer literacy program. Our church's donation of \$3500 helped make this happen. Literacy programs such as this help keep kids from backsliding in their reading skills, a common occurrence. The finale program gave the kids an opportunity to do some dance routines, to read out loud, and to talk about the fun they had while learning more about the joys of reading. I am proud that our congregation is committed to this program, and hope that we will continue to support it in the future.

Clay Arsenal Apartments:

"HUD finds mold, rodent infestation" -Hartford Courant. After it was reported that a young child was bitten by a mouse, CAC staff member AJ Johnson went into action. The tenants of those apartments where subjected to mice, mice droppings and other safety hazards. After several meetings, the absentee landlord Emmanuel Ku agreed to make substantial changes, after HUD issued him strict orders. As was noted in several Hartford Courant articles, and on Channel 30 news; the city of Hartford and HUD gave Ku the abatements and other monetary subsidies.

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. School:

Thanks to the efforts of parents, teachers and the Christian Activities Council - the new superintendent of schools Dr. Leslie Torres-Rodriguez and members of her staff have agreed to renovate the building. The proposal is to have MLK become a magnet and middle school. This community effort has paid big dividends to the children and their families.

The above reports indicate when all the people from different backgrounds come together, we can make a profound effect on people's lives!

Hello all, I thought you might find this article interesting. The Historical Society published it late last Spring in the <u>Rocky Hill Life</u>. (I have lightly edited it for space considerations). Enjoy... from your Church Historian – Steve Ware

<u>A Really Grand Old Flag</u> Bob Herron – Town Historian March 2017

Last spring Lisa Zerio (Parks and Recreation) contacted the Rocky Hill Historical Society about an old flag that had been stored at Parks & Recreation for many years. The flag is Civil War vintage. It has 34 stars arranged in a star pattern and measures 30 by 20 feet and research shows it to be very rare.





The flag was flown on a 100 foot high flag pole erected on the triangle in front of the Congregational Church. It flew daily at this site for ten years after the end of the Civil War until the flag

pole was struck by lightning and destroyed. The town postmaster took custody of the flag and when he died, Benjamin Smith took charge of it. Smith's daughter, Adeline gave it to the Order of American United Mechanics. When this group ceased to exist, a member of the Griswold family took the flag and ultimately gave it to the Town Clerk about 1931. It has been stored there ever since.

We know that a Griswold family member took custody of the flag but there are conflicting reports about which one. A 1912 article in the Hartford Courant says that Roger Griswold, apparently Rufus Griswold's son, took custody of the flag. A 1931 article says the flag went to William S. Griswold, proprietor of Sunnycrest Farm. According to the 1931 article, Mrs. Margaret Griswold wrote a history of the flag.

The Historical Society would like to encourage anyone who can increase our knowledge of this flag and its history to get in contact with Bob Herron. For example, they would love to find a copy of Mrs. Griswold's paper.




