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God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change...

It's perhaps not what you'd expect to read in a church's summer newsletter, but there it is: anxiety seems to be sharply on the increase all around us. There are habit-changing increases in the costs of gas, home heating oil and food, a housing crisis, a lengthy war, an intense presidential race,

tomatoes with salmonella, heat waves and typhoons and flooding and earthquakes. We're not to the point of mountains tumbling into the sea as the psalmist describes, but there's a certain sense of general unease. Coupled with the very real individual stresses and circumstances with which many of you are coping, this feels a strenuous season.

I have been reading a fair amount of C.S. Lewis lately, the English writer and theologian. Lewis was a brilliant man, incredibly articulate, and came to be crystal clear about what he believed and how Christian disciples should live. But then his wife of three years, Joy, died, and all his intellectual understanding and carefully thought out theories crashed down, could not provide any comfort. In *A Grief Observed*, Lewis described how, when all seemed lost to him, it was only when he stopped trying to find an explanation, stopped wishing things were different, stopped blaming himself for not doing discipleship "right," that God's presence—constant all along, though out of his sight—helped him find his bearings once more.

The faith expressed in Psalm 46 is the antidote to the worry that creeps into life from time to time; the balm when events just don't make sense to us. God does not make the tumult to cease, doesn't lower gas prices or stop the rains, but makes the tumult *inside* to stop—if we will choose to step back and step into that refuge. Life may look and feel and, indeed, truly be chaotic, but calm *is* possible in the midst of trouble. God's calm is already within, but we experience it when we discipline ourselves to first recognize when worry is holding sway, and then choose to stop, count our blessings, make ourselves talk about what we see and how we feel with ones who will listen, pray to feel the strength, and then move forward once more—even as the waters continue "roar and foam" around us. The times are challenging, but disciples—even in summer—say, "Onward!"

I plan on creating the teams in mid September, so let me know by then and I guarantee you'll have a good time.



Summer is a time of relaxation, reflection, and catching up. Your ONA Committee hopes that an Open and Affirming contemplation can be a part of your summer activities.

Our lending library has several books, articles, and DVDs to explore. The library is located outside the church office. Check it out. A recent addition is a DVD of the April 27 program offering by Dr. Wayne Rollins.

During July, we will continue to explore the topic of "What is it like to be gay? How does it feel to be the object of discrimination? Personal stories from O and A churches and people we love." We will do so via small group discussions of video presentations. Our July schedule is as follows:

The two videos that will be featured have been previewed by members of our committee and we believe that you will find them to be thought-provoking.

For the Bible Tells Me So

Through the experiences of five very normal, Christian, American families - including those of former House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt and Episcopal Bishop Gene Robinson - we discover how people of faith handle the realization of having a gay child or family member. Offering healing, clarity and understanding to anyone caught between scripture and sexual identity, this landmark film boldly takes on a loaded topic and examines it both intellectually and emotionally.

Length: 98 minutes. Appropriate Age: Sr. High, Adult

Open and Affirming - A Journey of Faith

Produced as a resource for congregations at the beginning point of considering whether or not to enter an Open and Affirming educational process. It is a valuable resource to churches for other reasons as well. ONA congregations will find the video helpful in further clarifying the significance of their actions. Congregations wishing to learn more about the experience of lesbian and gay Christians will find the video a good, non-threatening introduction to the topic.
