From the Interim Senior Pastor

Above all, trust in the slow work of God. We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay. We should like to skip the intermediate stages. We are impatient of being on the way to something unknown, something new. And yet it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability and that it may take a very long time.

And so I think it is with you; your ideas mature gradually—let them grow, let them shape themselves, without undue haste. Don't try to force them on, as though you could be today what time (that is to say, grace and circumstances acting on your own good will) will make of you tomorrow.

Only God could say what this new spirit gradually forming within you will be. Give Our Lord the benefit of believing that his hand is leading you, and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete.

During my first week at Rocky Hill Congregational Church, I had a chance to share this reflection with both the church staff and the Church Council.



It's one of the things I return to again and again, when I want or need to remember what the nature of process is, what the character of transition is like. Or when I myself am feeling the impatience of which Teilhard speaks. To be reminded that the uncertainty of "intermediate stages" is God's work in us is to be reminded that the things that disrupt us are also the things that, potentially, deepen us. And so they are good.

This is the spiritual ground on which I see transitional ministry and transitional times for congregations. Yes, yes, I know that "we should like to skip the intermediate stages." We can't. I know we are possibly "impatient." It's normal. But I also know that "it is the law of all progress that it is made by passing through some stages of instability" and that it takes time. Nothing I have experienced in many years of ministry would make me doubt the wisdom of this as applied to churches.

In the United Church of Christ, our process for the search and call of a new pastor takes time, because it takes preparation. It takes preparation because in our system, the congregation is highly involved and selects its own pastors, and so a formative and informative process is vital. While we will not want to take more time than is necessary for this work at RHCC, we will also want to allow enough time for good grounding and good process, so that the task can be completed well. I will be working with you as a congregation, and with your leaders, to discern the appropriate timing for the process before us.

Meanwhile, it's summer....which I hope affords all of us some experience of "Sabbath" that often belongs uniquely to this season. I look forward to getting to know you all, and am grateful for the opportunity to be part of the "intermediate stages" with you for a little while.


Meghan Young, our Acting Associate Pastor, has moved her office from the second floor to the Associate Pastor's office across from the Fiorilli Room.


