From the Interim Senior Pastor

"Remember the Sabbath, to Keep It....."



Recently I met a pastor of the Seventh Day Adventist church, which believes that Jesus is coming back again soon (that's the "Adventist" part) and that Saturday is the true Sabbath day for Christians (that's the Seventh-Day part). Saturday, not Sunday, is the seventh day of the week, and since, according to the first creation story in Genesis (there are two different ones), God "rested on the seventh day, after all the work He had done in creation," then humans also are to rest on the seventh day. Hence a Saturday Sabbath. The pastor I met was adamant about this.

Since I don't take the Genesis creation stories literally, I am not too concerned about what counts as the literal seventh day. I am more concerned about whether the concept of Sabbath itself counts at all with us, anymore. Trying to find anybody who gets out from under their working, their calendar, their computer, and all related striving for one whole day each week, including myself, is next to impossible. Now that we can have work literally at our fingertips, since most of us carry around phones that are also computers, we are almost never disconnected from our usual daily activity long enough to call it anything like a "Sabbath." If true Sabbath is meant to free us up long enough, once in every week, that we rest, renew, and regain perspective on what goes on the other six days, then many of us don't have it, on any day. A few hours here or there aren't enough. From respites that brief, we readily snap back into a sabbathless mind, which is often a fatigued mind, which then becomes an unreceptive mind.

And despite the fact that in Hebrew Scripture, Sabbath-keeping is one of the Ten Commandments ("Remember the Sabbath, to keep it holy"), even churches can be sabbathless places. We too buy into our culture's certainty that busyness = worth, that more activity must be inherently better than less activity. Maybe it's the remnant of that Puritan heritage that equated idleness with sin: if you're not productively occupied, you are vulnerable to the devil. How on earth would you ever take a day off, if that's what you really believed? That's one way we imagine our indispensability.

But there's the problem in a way, that we are so concerned with the importance of our own roles and the production that comes from them that we slip from any true reading of grace, which, by definition, never depends on us or the quantity of our work or the roles we inhabit. Until we know that, we don't want to let go of our activity, because we think so much is riding on it, including our very value and significance, even, perhaps, to God. We might *say* we believe that nothing we can do will make God love us less, and nothing we can do will make God love us more. But we don't live that way.

Sometimes, it is summer that helps us. If ever we give ourselves permission to lighten up a bit and keep some Sabbath time, some actual unfilled time, it might be summer. Someone once referred to the purpose of a Sabbath as "time spent remembering what time is for." I hope these days and weeks of summer might offer something of that to all of us, if we'll take it. I'm pretty sure we need it. It's not for nothing that Sabbathkeeping is a commandment. "Remember the sabbath, to keep it holy." And wholly.

Fourth Sunday after Pentecost; Communion

Gen. 24:34-38, 42-49, 58-67; Ps. 45:10-17 or Song of Sol. 2:8-13 or Zech 9:9-12; Ps. 145:8-14, Rom. 7:15-25a; Matt. 11:16-19, 25-30

July 13 through August 24: Summer Sermon Series

"Living Stones: Imagining the Future of the Church"

A series of sermons meant to engage us together in imagining how, and reflecting on why, the church might move forward – in a time very different from the past.



July 13 Fifth Sunday after Pentecost

1 Peter 2:1-10 "Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house..."

What would it mean to be a church of living stones, letting ourselves be built by God, not our own hands, a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices?

July 20 Sixth Sunday after Pentecost

Ezekiel 37:1-14 "The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones...He said to me 'Mortal, can these bones live?"

What would it mean to truly believe God can breathe new life into our dry bones? What would it mean to be a church, willing to go through the noise, and rattling, and growth, as God's spirit breathes life?

July 27Seventh Sunday after Pentecost; Laity Sunday
Members of the congregation will lead worship.

Romans 12:1-8 "Don't be conformed to the world, be transformed by the renewal of your minds... We are like one body, with many parts but not all with the same function."

What would it mean to be a church with a presence in the world that is not just like the world, and where a variety of gifts are discovered, used and welcomed?

August 3Eighth Sunday after Pentecost; Communion

Acts 17:22-34 "The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands."

Jesus said nothing about "Church" as an institution, but much about faith and love. What would it mean to be a church not tied to the bounds of membership and building, but living by Jesus' great commission to go and make disciples?



August 10 Ninth Sunday after Pentecost

Acts 3:1-16 "One day Peter and John were going up to the temple at the hour of prayer...And a man lame from birth was being carried in... And he fixed his attention on them, expecting to receive something from them, but Peter said, 'I have no silver or gold, but what I have I give you; in the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, stand up and walk.""

What would it mean to stop and look up as we dash to our "temples" (jobs, committee meetings, resume building activities, etc.) and offer the love of God, recognizing that God calls us to be in the world?

August 17Tenth Sunday after Pentecost

Isaiah 56:1, 6-8 " 'My house shall be called a house of prayer, for all peoples,' says God, who gathers the outcasts. 'I will gather yet others besides those already gathered.'''

What would it mean to understand the church as primarily a "house of prayer," and God as a God who means to gather in the ones who aren't here yet?

August 24Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost

Luke 5:1-11 "Jesus said to Simon, 'Push out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' It was no sooner said than done – a huge haul of fish, so many it strained the nets."

What would it mean to understand our core purpose as the church to be about depth, our main task as "going deeper"?

August 31Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost

Ex. 3:1-15; Ps. 105:1-6, 23-26 or Jer. 15:15-21; Ps. 26:1-8; Rom. 12:9-21; Matt. 16:21-28

Church School
